Entertainment by Internationally Known Musician - Daryl Davis

One of Montgomery County's own, Mr. Daryl Davis, a 1976 graduate of Thomas S. Wootton High School, will perform at our luncheon. Daryl earned his Bachelor of Music degree from Howard University, where he was a member of the Howard University Choir and Jazz Vocal Ensemble. In addition to being a vocalist, guitarist, composer and pianist, Daryl is a professional actor and author.

As a performer, Daryl has worked with countless greats such as Elvis Presley's Jordanaires, The Coasters, and has been a long-standing regular player with the rock and roll legend, Chuck Berry. This past October, Daryl performed with Mr. Berry at the Strathmore Music Center to a sold out audience.

Toolkits For Needy Kindergartners

Our Toolkits, Books, and Backpacks Project, initially suggested by Dr. Weast, is currently in its eighth year of existence, a year when the need for it has never been greater. Through the generosity, caring, and commitment of hundreds and hundreds of individuals, we have assembled and distributed over 8,000 toolkits in the past seven years. In addition we have collected and distributed thousands of gently used books and purchased 4,500 new ones for children in grades 1 through 5 attending the Title I SAIL (Summer Adventures in Learning) Program. In the past three years over 100 backpacks of school supplies have also been presented to homeless children attending summer school.

What is included in each toolkit? Each year we purchase items, if possible, from a list suggested by kindergarten teachers for use at home. Last year's kit contained: 2 pencils, a pencil sharpener, ruler, large rubber eraser, number line, glue stick, set of magnetic letters with spelling lesson plan, box of 48 crayons, set of alphabet cards, pad of paper, pair of scissors, container of Play-Doh, bag of 20 plastic bottle caps, calendar, poem introducing the toolkit, poem with accompanying reading lesson plan, and math lesson plan for use with the plastic bottle caps. All printed materials are provided in both English and Spanish.

We frequently hear from people who want to know why we collect bottle caps. Many math concepts presented in the kindergarten curriculum involve counting, sorting, and understanding relationships such as **same**, **most**, **least**, **smallest**, and **biggest**. By providing at least 20 bottle caps in each kit, children can sort by color, arrange them from smallest to biggest, identify which color they have the most of, least of, or same. They can also use them to learn to add and subtract, determine odd and even, and much more. For the 1500 toolkits that were assembled and distributed last summer we sorted, counted, and bagged 30,000 caps.

Currently we do NOT need any more caps for this summer. The word has spread to Girl Scout troops, entire retirement communities, youth groups and elementary schools, and friends, relatives, and neighbors from North Carolina to New York. We are in the process of washing them to get ready for counting and bagging them.

We continue to rely on your help to assure the success of this project. Please consider not only sponsoring toolkits with a tax-deductible monetary donation but also volunteering in one or more of the many ways listed below. Thanks on behalf of all the needy children you are helping each summer.

RESPONSE TO SURVEY

Because of the status of the financial systems and the state and local budget questions, President Gerry Johnson and the Board of Directors have suggested the need to provide more information to MCPSRA members about these concerns. To obtain a clear picture, a brief survey was taken at the February 24, 2011, luncheon. Twenty four members responded. Since there were a number of concerns and questions, the responses to these concerns will be spread over several newsletters.

One of the first and main questions was "How safe is our retirement money?" A related article was written by Dr. Ken Muir and is printed in the February 2011 MRSPA.(State) Newsletter. He explains how the Teachers Retirement System is presently funded. The January Retiree News and Notes from the Maryland State Retirement and Pension System also states "Regardless of the economic events and the market volatility of recent years, the system remains financially sound and committed to the long term funding goals. A related problem, however, is that presently the Teachers System is only 65.41% funded by the state.

Is the system safe? See statements above! Could there be changes affecting retirees? There is always the very slight possibility. However, past changes in the program have always affected future retirees, not existing retirees. The fact is that there is no discussion of changes to pensions for those already retired. Furthermore an Attorney General's opinion indicates that those already retired have a contract with the state for their pension that cannot be changed.

TRIATHLETE AND IRONMAN COMPETITOR

Charlie Futrell, former MCPS physical education teacher, competes in these events at the age of 89 (90 in August). He has won two World Triathlon championships and five national championships. WELCOME TO BOSTON July 2-5, 2011

This vibrant, thriving city is renowned for its cultural facilities, world-class educational institutions, champion sports franchises and its place at the forefront of American history. The highlight of the trip features the Boston Pops and fireworks over the Charles River.

Day 1 - Saturday, July 2

6:30 am Depart Norbeck Park and Ride Lot Today we travel with lunch and rest stops en route before checking into the **Holiday Inn Select** in **Woburn, MA Day 2 - Sunday, July 3**

After a continental breakfast at the hotel, we embark on a **Historic Boston Tour** including parts of the **Freedom Trail** and a visit to **Old North Church**. We will also visit the **Charlestown Navy Yard** to see the **USS Constitution**, the oldest commissioned warship afloat in the world. Lunch is on your own at **Quincy Market** where there are over 100 shops, carts and artisans to offer treasures to take home. After lunch we head across the Charles River to Cambridge and see **Harvard University and Harvard Yard**. In the late afternoon we go to the **Esplanade** and settle in with a **Summer Barbeque Picnic**. At 8:30 pm the **Boston Pops 4th of July Rehearsal Concert** begins! (Eyre provides folding chairs for dinner and concert.)

Day 3 - Monday, July 4

After a continental breakfast at the hotel, we travel to Boston Harbor to board a cruise ship for a 2 ½ hour **Boston Harbor Cruise** that includes a buffet lunch with boiled lobster. In the afternoon, we visit the **JFK Library and Museum**. A pastastation dinner is included tonight at the **Hyatt Regency Cambridge** which is ½ mile from the fireworks barge. **Evening Options**: A. After dinner take your chair and walk the few blocks to the MA Avenue Bridge where you can hear (but not see) the concert. Watch the fireworks from there and walk back to the hotel where the coach will be parked.

B. Stay at the Hyatt and watch the entire 4th of July Concert on a big screen where it will be simulcast. (There is no way to see the Boston Pops up close this evening which is why we go the rehearsal on July 3.)
