



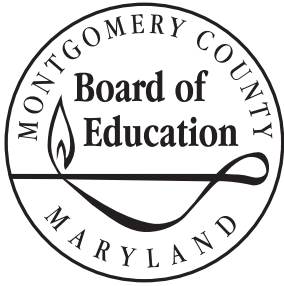

American Institute for Foreign Study Summer Advantage Study Abroad

Summer Advantage Study Abroad programs provide high school students aged 16 and older who have completed their sophomore year with a taste of university life before they enroll in college, as well as help strengthen their prospects for acceptance at a university through foreign study or liberal arts courses abroad. Most U. S. colleges transfer credits for completed work. Programs are available in China, England, France, Italy, Russia, and Spain. The program fee includes tuition, excursions, and cultural activities, housing, some meals, transcripts, services of an on-site Resident Director, and Resident Advisors, and round-trip airfare from select U.
