COMMUNITY INDIVIDUAL

Clarence McNeary

Mr. Clarence McNeary serves as a youth development specialist at the Watkins Mill High School (Watkins Mill) Wellness Center. Mr. McNeary has strived to provide positive youth development and services to more than 100 students each year, specifically focusing on African American males, but serving all Watkins Mill students for the past three years. Mr. McNeary implemented curriculum-based programs such as goal setting, leadership, sexual health, and Black male empowerment. He played a vital part in the student ambassador program that provided stipends for students to take a leadership role in food insecurity and vaccination clinic outreach.

Mr. McNeary was the original director of a food distribution site at Montgomery Village Middle School, serving more than 500 residents each Saturday for a year with many hours of outreach, coordination, volunteer management, and distribution. Mr. McNeary serves in these roles at Watkins Mill, his alma mater. Mr. McNeary also is a football coach who provides mentoring and leadership in the boys to men program. He also coaches the Excel Beyond the Bell program at Montgomery Village and Forest Oak middle schools

Mr. McNeary is a model candidate for the Distinguished Service to Education award for all of the contributions, caring, and time he devotes to Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) students and families.

Catherine Navarrete

Ms. Catherine "Cate" Navarrete is inspirational in her leadership of a club, which is now a nonprofit; she founded the Body Positive Alliance (BPA). This organization grew, during the global pandemic, from a handful of friends and classmates at Walt Whitman High School (Whitman) to a regional nonprofit with 13 chapters across public and private schools in the Washington, D.C. area. Ms. Navarette leads rich discussions and interactive lessons, arranges for guest speakers, and has established a social media presence. When the pandemic hit, she took BPA online and created new chapters at other high schools. Then she expanded to hosting a podcast, thus increasing the sphere of her influence. Ms. Navarette is a leader among leaders, a visionary, and does all of this while maintaining a rigorous course load and various other extracurriculars, demonstrating her ability to manage her time and commitments wisely.

Ms. Navarette's advocacy is her greatest passion. She is unafraid to begin new initiatives to serve real needs in her community. During the Covid-19 pandemic, Ms. Navarette launched an eight-episode podcast called Generation Body Positive, built the website for the Body Positive Alliance and related multimedia platforms, and initiated nonprofit status for the organization. She also published an article in *Darling* magazine titled "Why the Fashion Industry Needs to Evolve." As the founder and executive director of the Body Positive Alliance, a 501(c)(3) organization,

Ms. Navarette has turned her own eating disorder recovery into a bodypositive movement, which is having a tremendous impact on teens across the nation. She is well deserving of this Distinguished Service to Public Education Award.

Alexandra Robbins

Ms. Alexandra Robbins, a Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) graduate, has gone above and beyond to devote herself to supporting MCPS staff and public education during the pandemic. In early 2021, when vaccine appointments were hard to find, she started hunting for and booking appointments specifically for MCPS teachers and school staff. The need was so great that she founded Adopt-a-Vax, a group that worked late into the nights to "adopt" people and book vaccine appointments for them, first for MCPS educators and staff and their families, then for low-income, Black, Latino, and nonnative English-speaking community members in Montgomery County.

Ms. Robbins was a voluntary recess/lunch monitor from 2013 to 2020, and she has been an MCPS substitute teacher/paraeducator since 2019. Instead of keeping her substitute teaching paychecks, she uses them to purchase classroom supplies, books, pick-me-ups, and personal protective equipment (PPE) for teachers and school staff. This is something she does quietly under the radar. Ms. Robbins' efforts to help make MCPS staff and students feel safe and cared for are remarkable and inspiring.

She has had a deep, lasting, outstanding impact on students, the school system, and the MCPS community. By helping to facilitate vaccinating school staff and by donating masks, PPE, hand sanitizers, and soap to schools, she helped MCPS keep teachers and their families as safe as possible. By volunteering as a recess/lunch monitor, she bolstered school staffing. As a substitute educator, Ms. Robbins makes every student feel loved, and teachers know that when she covers for their classes, their students will not miss a beat in the curriculum. She even comes up with extra creative touches beyond the substitute plans. She is a bonus to MCPS and to our community.

The Foundation for Hospitality and Restaurant Management

In 2018, before the uncertainty of the Covid-19 pandemic, The Foundation for Hospitality and Restaurant Management (FHRM) was a newly created foundation within Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS). Dedicated hospitality leaders joined ranks with representatives from educational entities and established a nonprofit, 501 (c)(3) organization. With a mission of creating opportunities within the hospitality and restaurant management industry, the goal of FHRM has been to attract future hospitality leaders and entrepreneurs.

As a response to MCPS's Strategic Plan, FHRM has been dedicated to reducing and eliminating disparities in student learning. For example, prior to the creation of FHRM, county high schools offered hospitality-related courses. However, there was no cohesive curriculum addressing a variety of opportunities in place for students. Students engaged in culinary-arts-related courses at Paint Branch High School operate a frequently visited café and have provided catered events to outside organizations, while Edison High School of Technology students operate their café only periodically. In order to promote equal opportunities for students, FHRM has been working with MCPS to implement curriculum standards and further develop a curriculum that ensures equitable experiences, no matter where students access FHRM programming.

Through curriculum revitalization for programming, FHRM partners are working to ensure that participants will have solid foundational skillsets for a lucrative career. FHRM's endless pursuits to ensure the highest-achieving MCPS graduates make the foundation an exemplary candidate for the Distinguished Service Award.

Paisano's Rockville

Paisano's Rockville, managed by Mr. Manny Chavez, holds several fundraisers each school year for elementary, middle, and high schools in Rockville. Paisano's Rockville, through Mr. Chavez, goes above and beyond to anticipate the needs of staff and students in Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) and finds new and innovative ways to be of service. They are in tune with the climate in the county, when teachers need support or there is a need to give special thanks with goodies or discounts and encourage students to be involved in their community. Little wonder that Mr. Chavez and Paisano's Rockville was nominated by four different individuals for this award.

Mr. Chavez has been a huge supporter of Richard Montgomery athletics. He has provided discounts for pizza for concessions and has arranged for delivery as well. Paisano's Rockville hosts restaurant nights for Twinbrook and Flower Valley elementary schools, Richard Montgomery High School, and Julius West Middle School. They are a regular pizza contributor for Booster Club concession stands for fall and winter seasons at Richard Montgomery, Walter Johnson, and Rockville high schools (indoor). They even donate 15 pizzas each month to the safety patrol meeting at Bayard Rustin Elementary School. Their outreach does not reach just appetites! They also have held a Winter Weather (hat and glove) Drive for students at Twinbrook Elementary School during a challenging winter.

Manny Chavez tries to think outside the box in order to support MCPS staff. He often asks what countywide events are coming up and stays on top of the MCPS calendar to see when teachers need a special pick-me-up! He and his Paisano's Rockville team are very deserving of this Distinguished Service Award.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS STAFF-

Sharon Asro Faber

When ESOL and Theater Teacher Mrs. Sharon Asro Faber began teaching at Watkins Mill High School in 2016, she created and carved out the first theater course designed for new immigrants to our country. Mrs. Faber worked with the administration to develop a user-friendly, full-year arts elective curriculum that students enjoy taking as their elective credit(s) toward graduation. The program is highly popular and grew from one section to three sections in its first year. It continues to be in demand and thrive. As part of Watkins Mill's ESOL Student Pathway toward graduation, counselors are encouraged to place ESOL 9th and 10th grade students into Mrs. Faber's theater course for the social-emotional skills her class provides students to better prepare them for college and career readiness. Community stakeholders like Imagination Stage say that Mrs. Faber is their "Number 1 Partner" in the greater Washington, D.C. area, because she collaborates with them to bring meaningful weekly bilingual Drama Workshops with professional actors and teaching artists, making real-life theater even more accessible to her emergent multilingual learners, at no cost to the school or students.

For the past six years, Mrs. Faber has been able to uplift and expose approximately 600 English language learners (ELL) to an innovative theater program, using best practice culturally based, trauma-informed theater and arts activities to create a sense of community among the participants and provide a safe space for immigrant youth to share their stories. The aim is to help students begin the healing process that will allow them to assimilate into their new community and make them feel welcome.

Mrs. Faber's ESOL-Theater program provides ideal opportunities for ELL to tap into and develop the social-emotional skills they need to be successful in college and career. Allowing them to participate and interact with a culturally sensitive bilingual play and drama workshops that speak to their experience and personal stories, allows them to connect and acclimate to their new surroundings and enhance their literacy. It engages them in their learning by encouraging them to speak English with less hesitancy and more confidence, and helps provide social support to succeed, aligning with the Strategic Framework of Montgomery County Public Schools.

Cara Grant

Dr. Cara Grant has more than 20 years of service supporting students, families, and community across numerous work groups, including Pride Alliance, Montgomery County Appointed ex-officio member of the Commission on Health, Montgomery County Government Human Trafficking Committee, Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) Health Professional Learning Network, MSDE PE Professional Learning Network, MSDE Adapted Physical Education Professional Network, and many other organizations. Additionally, she has been pivotal in shaping countywide initiatives, including Be Well 365 and the innovative schools' wellness component, linking organizations and fostering cross-office work within central office, as well as with outside government agencies and businesses.

During the past three years, Dr. Grant has continued her work serving the whole child through project development in Be Well 365, developing MSDE health and physical education curriculum framework documents, linking schools with free equipment and resources before and during the Covid-19 pandemic (i.e., delivering Free PE kits at lunch pickup during the Covid closure). Her work includes development of adapted physical education, health education, and physical education curriculum materials and resources. She worked to develop extended physical activity opportunities through online modules for summer, integrating social emotional learning and mental health connections with students. She enlists and recruits students to contribute their voice and perspective in curriculum development and enhancements. She serves with equity, diversity, and inclusion, as exhibited through state and national presentation work and a focus on connecting the equity office with health and physical education content. She is a constant advocate for all students to be seen and heard in and through the curriculum, as exhibited by her longstanding work with the LGBTQ+ community and Choose Respect Montgomery. Student wellness and wellbeing is a priority in Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS), due to her influence and support in numerous committees, work groups, products, and curricula provided.

Simply put, the impact is equity and access (i.e, distribution of physical education kits during Covid, with a focus on Title I schools). When she is in the room, she is a fierce advocate and voice who is not afraid to speak up on behalf of those who may not be represented at the table. For all of these reasons, she is deserving of this Distinguished Service Award.

Marney Jacobs

Ms. Marney Jacobs, the administrative secretary at Ashburton Elementary School (Ashburton), is a committed member of the Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) community and exemplifies all that the Board of Education's Distinguished Service to Public Education in Montgomery County Award stands for. Ms. Jacobs exemplifies all that MCPS wants from its employees and while she does so much for Ashburton, Walter Johnson High School (Walter Johnson), MCPS, and the Service Employees International Union Local 500 (SEIU), she does so with a quiet leadership, often in the background, but very much running the show.

She is incredible as the administrative secretary in the largest elementary school in MCPS, performing all of the duties in her job description faithfully, as well as duties that are outside of it. Ms. Jacobs has been an incredible partner to the staff at Ashburton and has scaled her impact to other organizations within MCPS. Mrs. Jacobs attends community events at Ashburton and Walter Johnson; she is a fixture in the Ashburton neighborhood and has served as a Parent Teacher Association (PTA) president at Ashburton. She has worked with the Montgomery County Board of Education (Board) members to foster stronger relationships between the Board and the school community and has represented the voices of PTA, SEIU, and MCPS with clarity, passion and a commitment to students.

Ms. Jacobs' principal noted that she has been the ideal partner, stewarding the school's vision to seek equitable outcomes for all students. She is passionate about equity, will often attend educational conferences and sessions focused on equity on her own time, and often passes around books related to equity to the staff. She is innovative in her approaches to the job, but always keeps her focus on what is best for students.

Ms. Jacobs is the gold standard for administrative secretaries in MCPS and a good person, which is why so many families, staff members, and students feel as connected to her as they do to their own family. Ms. Jacobs' work has brought in thousands of dollars in donations for schools in MCPS. Her work has helped students feel safe at school and their ability to learn in a positive environment is increased, and members of the community feel a deep sense of pride and love.

Matthew Kamins

Mr. Matthew Kamins has dedicated more than 30 years of service to Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS), both as a school psychologist and as the supervisor of Psychological Services. His dedication to the students of MCPS has always come first and foremost. Mr. Kamins' combination of content knowledge and commitment to students is unparalleled.

According to one principal, "Mr. Kamins' greatest strength as a school psychologist is his supportive, empathetic, and caring approach to building relationships with staff members, students, and parents." He demonstrates a positive, collaborative problem-solving orientation with students, parents and guardians, staff members, and administrators. During meetings with parents, he has an exceptional way of communicating and easing their concerns or distress with his incredible skills of active listening, realness, respect, and courtesy. Mr. Kamins' wealth of psychological strategies and the resources he shares combined with his compassionate responsiveness to the individual needs of children, staff, and families is beyond commendable.

Among his many accomplishments, Mr. Kamins, was cochair for the first and only MCPS Mental Health Task Force. He was instrumental in developing the first school system crisis response (Critical Incident Stress Management program, based on Jeff Mitchell Model) and trained staff in that model. Named psychological services specialist and then supervisor of psychological services, Mr. Kamins is, quite simply, an innovator who facilitates systems-level change as easily as he guides the implementation of effective interventions for academically struggling or behaviorally challenging students. He is guided by the research, and yet he has the wisdom and experience to know how to adapt sound research into pragmatic, user-friendly practice. He is dedicated to data-based decision making and a full, multitiered range of services, support, strategies, and programs; and yet, he is an independent thinker who does not embrace a model or approach simply because someone says that needs to be done.

Mr. Kamins is a practitioner's practitioner—a leader and supervisor extraordinaire. He motivates an entire staff of school psychologists and other related services professionals to take on new, yet necessary, roles—as consultants, mental health practitioners, and academic and behavioral intervention specialists. He is an asset to MCPS and very deserving of this Distinguished Service Award.

Kristin Secan

Ms. Kristin Secan is a strong, passionate, and child-centered leader who leads the charge for elevating autism services within Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS). She has been instrumental in expanding services for students with autism from one classroom serving students who were significantly impacted by autism into a large, countywide spectrum of services.

Ms. Secan consistently keeps students at the center of all decision making and advocates for high-quality educational experiences for all students. Within MCPS, she is highly regarded for her leadership and mentors emerging leaders within the Department of Special Education Services. Under her leadership, autism services in Montgomery County have grown to be internationally recognized and respected.

During the systemwide closure caused by the Covid-19 pandemic, Ms. Secan provided leadership to ensure that all alternate learning outcome (ALO) students in Montgomery County had access to high-quality virtual instruction and also helped to prioritize special education students when MCPS prepared for returning students to in-person instruction. She worked to ensure that all special education classrooms were provided with necessary and appropriate personal protective equipment when they returned to in-person instruction in March 2021. Ms. Secan played a large part in leading the team that developed and implemented training related to a safe return to school for ALO students prior to March 2021, when in-person instruction resumed.

In the past five years, Ms. Secan has prioritized collaboration with stakeholders and community partners to include the Special Education Advisory

Committee (SEAC), Xminds, Montgomery County Police Department

Autism/IDD and Alzheimer's Outreach Program, adult service agencies, and nonpublic educational leaders. Ms. Secan led her team in creating a website that provided at-home resources and parent training for families during the pandemic. Ms. Secan has been an active participant in the autism community in Montgomery County for the past 40 years, starting with Montgomery

County Autism Society of America (MCASA) in the 1980s, then working with many community organizations over the years. She is dedicated and passionate and very deserving of this Distinguished Service Award.

INDIVIDUAL PIONEER

Daniel Evans

Mr. Daniel Evans is a candidate for the award for Distinguished Service to Public Education in Montgomery County Public Schools by virtue of 33 years of service as the Richard Montgomery High School (Richard Montgomery) social studies teacher and coach of their Mock Trial Team. Mr. Evans has provided outstanding service and leadership to numerous students for his 33 years, the last 8 years of which followed Mr. Evans' retirement in 2014.

The specific impact provided includes the opportunities afforded the Mock Trial Team annually, the recognition of Richard Montgomery as being consistently successful at a highly competitive and rigorous level, plus the pride enjoyed by the Richard Montgomery community in witnessing the success of this team over a 33-year period. The team's record over the years in awards and accomplishments has been significant (26 years as Montgomery County champions; 10 years as Maryland state finalists; and 4 years as Maryland state champions). However, Mr. Evans would be the first to highlight his team members' love of competition along with developing an appreciation of the American judicial system as byproducts of team membership.

Team members acquire a proficiency in life skills, along with an enhanced interest in their curricular studies, directly leading into other academic areas. Students learn to listen, read extensively, and critique all facets of those cases assigned. Numerous former team members remain in communication with Mr. Evans, with many entering the legal profession. As an example, two Richard Montgomery graduates have won the prestigious Bates Award from the Michigan University Law School, given annually to an outstanding senior.

A characteristic distinguishing Mr. Evans from other individuals is the length of time he served as Mock Trial coach. Team selection, preparation for trials, and consistent follow-up with the entire team, including alternates, is significantly time consuming. To remain involved for this length of time, including eight years into retirement, is a testament to his passion and love of teaching.

Mr. Evans, as his students would affirm, is truly outstanding and deserving of this Distinguished Service Award.
