It's hard to believe it is February 2021 already! We continue to be amazed at what your children are doing online and the proficiency that they have shown in how to use instructional technology. While it is understood that virtual instruction is completely different from in-person learning, we are seeing our Rockwell students make gains in learning.

As you likely know, we are in the midst of planning for a return to the building for in-person instruction on a timeline that will be determined by the

Montgomery County Board of Education at their meeting scheduled for Tuesday, February 9. We have been setting up classrooms and planning for the safe movement throughout the building when it is occupied by both staff and students. Our planning centers on a variety of factors that have a tremendous influence on how our in-person instruction will look and be organized. We continue to examine the numbers of students who we expect to be in-person, the space limitations for our school building, and the staff available to provide instruction. In addition, we must consider and plan for the continuation of the online instructional program that we have maintained since the start of the school year.

MCPS has published the different types of instructional models possible in communication that was sent directly to all parents. A recent public announcement from MCPS about the return to in-person learning can be accessed here. We will communicate our specific plans once all important information is confirmed and the timeline is set by the MCPS BOE- stay tuned!

Thank you, parents, for all that you are doing to partner with us to make virtual learning the best it can be for your children. We appreciate your children, and we appreciate you and your dedication to work with us in this challenging year.

As part of MCCPTA's SSL committee's work, we wanted to share information about a number of MCPS HS student-led groups providing free virtual tutoring to K-8 students across the County. These student tutors have either an MCPS faculty or non-profit SSL sponsor and have been through a formal interview process. Tutors have also taken the MCPS Volunteers and Contractors: Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse and Neglect online training course.

Many of these student-led groups have posted their services on a platform called <u>Kiddo</u>, which provides families looking for free learning support a single place to search and register for those services. This free virtual tutoring platform is the Central platform for families to search and register for free student-led tutoring services. Families can also contact the student-led tutoring services directly --

- Stepping Stone Tutoring- Led by Montgomery Blair HS students

- MoCo Pineapple Tutoring- Led by Winston Churchill HS students

- Generation Z Tutoring- Led by Richard Montgomery HS students

Note -- the student-led programs operate independent registration sites but have joined this central platform. Kiddo is a local Montgomery County startup that is completely free to use for all families and service providers. It was built with the intention of being a central space for families and local enrichment service providers to connect, with a core social mission around driving extracurricular programming accessibility to underserved communities.

Chromebook Repairs

Chromebook repairs will now need to go through a process outlined in the Chromebook Obligations document. To summarize this document, if you have an issue with your MCPS Chromebook:

- Go to 45 West Gude Drive.
- Parents should park in the 45 West Gude Drive parking lot and walk up to the front overhang parallel to Gude Drive.
- Provide Students ID#, First and Last Name, School, and Contact Information. Please ensure the accuracy of the information.
- A loaner device can be requested at this location if inventory is available.
- The loaner may be a different model than the original Chromebook but should still allow all accessibility.
- Once the repair is complete, the child's school will contact the parent/guardian to arrange a time for pick up.
 - Parents/guardians will also be notified of any incurred cost. The Chromebook Obligations Repair Costs document provides details.
 - If the loaner device is not returned, there will be a \$100 flat fee.

All schools will continue to implement social-emotional supports for students.

Student Well-Being Teams:

**Rockwell Elementary has a Student Well-Being Team, and we meet weekly to discuss and brainstorm supports for students and families. If you have a concern about your child or your family, please reach out to Mrs. Clark, Mr. Isabell, Mrs. Kane, or your child's

teacher. We want to be sure that we support all of our families.**

Schools have designated student well-being teams that will receive referrals for student support from school staff and families. These teams will support students who are struggling with social-emotional concerns, attendance, and engaging with online learning. They will also support the delivery and monitoring of Social Emotional Learning (SEL) lessons. The teams are comprised of school administrators, counselors, psychologists, pupil personnel workers (PPW's), parent community coordinators (PCC's), and other building staff.



Student Psychoeducational Lessons: All schools are required to implement a student psychoeducational lesson during a Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) schedule blocks in Student psychoeducational lessons provide direct crisis intervention support to students. This lesson will give the students crisis facts about the dual pandemic (COVID-19 and systemic racism) in our nation. It will also provide information on common crisis feelings/reactions, stress management strategies, and where to find help. Teachers will implement these lessons with coaching from the building counselors, psychologists, and other

school-based mental health staff. Families who have concerns about their child's ability to participate in the student psychoeducational lessons due to a mental health concern or a prior traumatic event should contact the school administration to request an alternative way of meeting the lesson objectives. The student will also be referred to the student well-being team for additional support.

Social-Emotional Learning Lessons: Throughout the school year, staff will provide Social Emotional Learning lessons to help students effectively apply the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions.



Family resources: Parent Academy workshops are free workshops that provide information, resources, and tools & tips to support student success. The **Parent Academy** is designed to inform and empower families as advocates and partners in their children's education. Workshops provide families with useful information and resources to support their children's academic and emotional well-being and help them be college and career

ready. Through a variety of learning opportunities, we hope to strengthen our engagement with families and the community. We recognize that behind every successful student are supportive families, teachers, school staff, and community members who take an active role in educating our students. We want our families and students to remain engaged throughout the school year. While we may not be able to meet face-to-face, Student, Family, and School Services are excited to provide

Board of Education Seeks Comments on Two Policies

The Board of Education is seeking comment on two policies—*IQD, Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, and a new draft policy, *JPH, School Food, and Nutrition Programs*. **Public comment for both policies is open until Friday, February 12, 2021.**

The Board is proposing amendments to <u>Board Policy IQD</u>, <u>Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities</u>. As a district committed to nondiscrimination, equity and cultural responsiveness, the Board seeks to balance the state and collegiate expectations with its interest in making extracurricular activities, including interscholastic sports, accessible to as many students as possible. The Board is also proposing a <u>new draft policy, Board Policy JPH</u>, <u>School Food and Nutrition Services Programs</u>. The new draft policy sets forth guidance regarding the ways in which MCPS is a partner in efforts to address childhood hunger in Montgomery County in order to support students' ability to learn, grow and maintain health. Engaging Students in Conversations About the Capitol Building Invasion, Riots and the Election

As the nation continues to reflect on and discuss the invasion at the U.S. Capitol building and ongoing threats of violence as we approach Inauguration Day, MCPS remains steadfast in its commitment to teach students about and modeling civility and respect for our democracy. All MCPS schools are providing ongoing support for students as well as an opportunity for students to learn and have conversations about the election process, inauguration, race and other challenging global and national issues. MCPS to Remain in Virtual Learning Until March 15

On Tuesday, January 12, 2021, the Board of Education voted to delay the start of returning small groups of students for in-person instruction from February 1, 2021, to March 15, 2021, on the condition that health metrics are met or health guidance is adjusted as a result of vaccine distribution. The County's COVID-19 new case rate and test positivity remain significantly above the thresholds adopted by the County and state. Read the message here. The Board will meet again on February 23, 2021, to determine if metrics can be met by March 15, 2021, for a safe return to in-person learning.
