Language Immersion & World Language Program Update

As you may know, in Fall 2018, WT Page Elementary School will begin a Spanish Immersion program for grade k-3 and a World Language (Spanish) program for all grades. Program details are continuing to be determined through Montgomery County Public Schools, but the process is moving forward. Ms. Brown is very involved and will share information as it determined and the Page PTA is seeking formal input into the process as well. Robyn Ivy, the PTA's Advocacy Chair, presented testimony to the Montgomery County Board of Education urging the Board to provide:

Meaningful Inclusion of Page parents in the Planning including working with a team of representatives from the WT Page PTA, in addition to school administrators, to ascertain our input and perspective on the best implementation of both the immersion and world language program at Page

Investment in developing a World Class World Language Program for Page ES including qualified teachers, resources and planning time to match national standards for the world language program

Increased accessibility for current Page students in the immersion program including reserving more seats in the 1^{st} grade lottery for Page families and reserving more seats for Page students that would test in for 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} grade.

Resources, Staffing & Facilities including developing a facilities plan that will include a permanent building addition and/or semi-permanent self-contained modular classrooms to properly accommodate the influx of new students.

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You Should Know



Important Dates & Deadlines

- In Early February, all 3rd grade students should receive a letter from MCPS notifying them if their child has been selected to take a test for the <u>Center for Enriched Studies (click here</u>) program at Charles Drew Elementary School. Parents will have the option to accept, decline or request that their child be tested (if they were not initially selected). Third grade students whose parents opted in or requested that they be tested will take the test at WT Page ES on February 28th. Information will be sent by MCPS prior to this date.
- **February 22nd**, is the deadline for Kindergarten Parents to apply to the <u>Takoma Park Magnet Program</u>. The Takoma Park Elementary School Primary Magnet is for 1st and 2nd graders and focuses on science and social studies. While instruction is based on the MCPS curriculum, students in this program will have opportunities to enrich and extend their learning beyond the grade-level goals. Interested parents must complete the <u>application form (click here)</u> and submit by February 22 and their child must be tested. This is a highly competitive program with very few seats available for out-of-boundary students each year. However, we encourage parents to apply if they are interested in this opportunity for their children.
- **February 23rd**, is the deadline for 5th grade students to apply to the <u>Middle School Magnet Consortium Lottery (click here)</u>. TO APPLY, students who live OUTSIDE the MSMC area AND who did NOT participate in Round 1 in the fall, can log in to their MCPS Google account and then to **bit.ly/choiceMSMC** (case sensitive) and <u>with their parents</u>, complete and submit their Choices for Round 2. There is a link from the bit.ly/choiceMSMC link to a Spanish Choice form in Adobe format for those OUT-of-Consortium students who need the <u>form in Spanish</u>. They will need to mail or fax the Spanish form into our office (address on form) by **February 23**.

On Tuesday February 13th at 6:30p, WT Page PTA will host a meeting to hear from parents and students who have attended these choice programs to help interested parents understand if these programs are right for their children and family.

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Every February, communities all across the country celebrate Black History Month, but how many people know the history of Black History month. This is from the History Channel:

Black History Month is an annual celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing the central role of blacks in U.S. history. The event grew out of "Negro History Week," the brainchild of noted historian Carter G. Woodson and other prominent African Americans. Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month. Other countries around the world, including Canada and the United Kingdom, also devote a month to celebrating black history.


The <u>History Channel's website has a short video</u> discussing more of the details of the history of Black History month that explains the origin and significance of this annual celebration.

Also, a great local resource on Black history and culture is the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture (NMAAHC) in Washington, DC. This museum was decades in the making and captures the full breadth and depth of Black history and culture in America through engaging exhibits and artifacts. The museum is a national treasure to tells the story of the development of the country through the vantage of African Americans. As is said, "Black history is American history". Click here for a list of events and initiatives at the NMAAHC for Black History Month. Another local treasure, is the National Museum of African Art, located on the national mall in DC. This somewhat hidden treasure (because the museum is located underground) has amazing artifacts and exhibits spanning the artistry and creativity of the African diaspora. For instance, in anticipation of the release of the Black Panther movie, the museum is hosting an evening discussion Rose Carter, the costume designer for the Black Panther movie. 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Advocacy Corner

MCPS 2019 Budget

While many parents are correctly focused on what happens in our children's classroom or school, there are district, county, state and federal processes and policies that have a big impact on what happens in the classroom. One major process is the budget process, which is a reflection of the priorities of policymakers at different levels of government. For instance, one of the Superintendent's priorities is offering more language immersion programs in the County, which is directly impacting WT Page ES with the introduction of our Language Immersion program next year.

On December 19th, MCPS Superintendent Dr. Jack Smith submitted his proposed MCPS FY 2019 budget officially kicking off a 6 month process of budget hearings and working with the Montgomery County Board of Education, Montgomery County Executive, the Montgomery County Council and the Maryland State Board of Education to determine the final MCPS budget for 2018/2019 academic year. Click here for an informative website created by MCPS is 2017 to describe the budget process and other related information.

This year's proposed budget of \$2.59 billion was submitted within the context of an anticipated \$120 million deficit for Montgomery County overall. In response to this, the Superintendent has looked for costs savings in central administration of MCPS following his mantra that teaching happens in the classrooms, not in the central office. However, some fear that some of these central administration cuts will have a negative impact on students in the classroom. For instance, The Montgomery County Gifted Child Committee (MCGCC) and the Gifted and Talented Association of Montgomery County (GTA) is asking parents and teachers to advocate against cuts to the Division of Accelerated and Enriched Instruction (AEI), including eliminating the position of AEI Director, that they argue will result in major reductions in both program capacity and MCPS leadership in meeting the needs of advanced learners. Similarly, some teachers, staff and students are concerned that proposed reduction in funding for the arts, including cutting the one full time arts content curriculum coordinator to a part-time position.

On January 30th, the Montgomery County Council <u>approved \$53 million in cuts</u> in the current 2018 budget, including \$25 million from MCPS's 2018 budget. The budget process for determining the 2019 MCPS is continuing with the following key dates:

- February 16th Board of Education adopts budget
- ♦ March 15, County Executive submits proposed Montgomery County operating budget to MC Council
- ♦ Early April Council hearings on the County budget
- ♦ June 1, Council must take final action on the FY 2019 budget.


