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How Was Their City Built?


- Surrounded by water

They dressed the dead in their best clothes and danced and chanted funeral prayers

for four days

Buried with possessions and food



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RELIGIOUS BELIEFS

gods controlled every thing on earth world was perched on a crocodile swimming in a sea of water lilies

Thought Cortés was Quetzalcoatl Sacrificed human blood



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TEMPLES & SHRINES

Lots of steps

Mounds of earth then covered with mounds of mud, bricks or stone

Temples at top

Temples dedicated to each god

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
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Kings


