Everyone looks forward to the snow, but no one realizes there are many hazards to driving in the snow. Although snow is awesome to look at, driving in the conditions that come with it are very dangerous.

The toll of snow-related crashes is extensive. The first few days it snows are more treacherous in terms of crashes than other snow days. In previous studies it has been shown that snow has increased crash rates up to 4-7 times per average. Yet the percentage of crashes in snowy days compared

to dryer days are relatively equal.

Snow makes driving dangerous by reducing tire traction and impairing visibility. At least the first few days it is best, if you postpone unnecessary travel. But if you must, drive slowly and carefully when you is on the road.

Tips to Stay Safe

•Turn on your lights in the morning or at night to increase your visibility to other motorists.

•Allow at least three times more space than usual between you and the car in front of you. •Brake gently to avoid skidding.

If You Skid

•Take your foot off the gas don't steer immediately.

•As the wheels skid sideways, they will slow the vehicle and traction will return. As it does, steer in the direction you want to go.

•When you have regained control accelerate gently.


A modern epic—a space opera where children battle an insectoid-like alien race—yet I found myself bored throughout half of the movie.

you a mental push to not care as well. "I don't care about my makeup / I like it better with my jeans all ripped up / I don't know how to keep my mouth shut / you say, I say."


However, the chorus in her song "Here's to Never Growing Up" sounded way too similar to Cher Lloyds song "Oath."

With hand gestures flying everywhere and a voice that escalates with passion and could jolt up even the laziest of teenagers, it is hard to believe that Mrs. Kuecker started out her career as a preschool teacher. In the classroom, the AP English Language & Composition teacher is famous for her enthusiasm and her electrifying personality. Her energy makes her students eager to write and learn that makes Mrs. Kuecker one of the best.

Making 16-year olds eager to stay up to date on current events and willing to diligently analyze the rhetorical strategies of a passage is a difficult task but, gracefully, Mrs. Kuecker has mastered that art over her 14-year teaching career at Magruder. Her attitude is a huge part of her success in the classroom. She knows how to fire up her students and truly make them feel

that what she teaches is important. It is the key to making students want to work so hard to impress their awesome teacher!

Even when the world of higher education seems to be urgently and increasingly pressing the importance of careerpreparatory STEM classes and pushing the humanities to the background, Mrs. Kuecker remains firm in her beliefs that what she teaches is still crucial and relevant. "It teaches you to think, and the ability to analyze language and to be able to write... Every single one of [my students] is going to have to be able to write, it doesn't matter what field they are going into." The work that students in AP Lang do is different than the breaking down of fictional works they have been doing in the past. Juniors are taught to analyze shorter biographical or non-fictional works to better understand rhetoric and author's purpose, and often, students are required to explore many current events or controversial issues in the news today. Mrs. Kuecker says she particularly enjoys teaching this class because they "get into a lot of discussions and [she] develops relationships with the students" by getting a chance to discuss these deeper issues.

All the passion, but what makes Mrs.

Kuecker stand out as an educator is her effort to connect to her students and get to know them on a deeper level. She is able to empathize with juniors' busy schedules and this makes her even more likeable. "Kids in 11th grade are pulled in a lot of directions, and I get that it's hard for them to devote as much time as I would like them to to my particular subject," she says with a laugh, but still does her best to push her students to love the subject. "I like teaching the junior class- I get to see them the following year and when they come back and say they have progressed in their writing, I feel that teaching them has been worthwhile. It's very rewarding."

As a parting note, Mrs. Kuecker leaves students with a good suggestion. "Literature throughout the ages has imparted so much wisdom; it still has a practical place in terms of being able to communicate effectively and there's the joy of sheer entertainment and escapism. You never have to be at loose ends if you're a reader. You can experience so many different things that life has to offer without having to experience them; you get to experience them vicariously." At first glance, junior Thomas Hill stands out among his peers with his tribal vest and beaded dreads. His talent for fashion is overshadowed when he talks about poetry.

"Poetry changed me," says Hill. Growing up he wasn't good at sports, didn't get the best grades, and overall didn't feel that he was good at anything. "When I started to write, I though 'Wow, I'm actually good at something," reflects Hill. He became more ambitious and didn't feel as odd. He felt confident enough to express himself and be who he truly was. Poetry allowed him to be himself in a way that no sport or school allowed him to be.

Hill belongs to the DC Youth Slam Team and participates in competitions around the DC area. His team even travelled to South Africa as part of a two week exchange program, where they met poets, writers, and activists, all part of a social movement to better society.

Most of Hill's poems are persona pieces, in which he takes a character role and narrates from the point of the role to create a deeper meaning. "My main focus is racial and sexual equality," says Hill.

Hill's poems are influenced by his experiences. One of his poetry performances took place at a juvenile detention center where his team helped the kids write poems. "Talking with these kids, I found out that there's things going on that people don't really know about or notice," says Hill. He feels that so-

ciety needs to start paying attention to the issues around us because things need to get better. He's an avid LGBT advocate and starts campaigns that focus on these issues.

He loves poetry because it lets him touch and change people. Thomas recounts a time he went to a summer camp where he met a boy who was afraid to admit his homosexuality to others. After talking with Hill and hearing him recite his poems, the boy decided to come out to his parents. "Things like that—helping people—keeps me going" says Hill.

Managing exam anxiety

You glance at the clock. Five minutes have passed and your pencil hasn't even touched the paper. Quickly, five minutes turns into 10 minutes, 10 to 15, 15 to 20. You've studied all week, yet you can't seem to put the answers on the form. This is a simple instance of test anxiety.

Test anxiety is a psychological condition in which people suffer severe distress before, during, and/or after an exam. Its symptoms include light-headedness, nausea, excessive sweating, headaches, and so on. Such symptoms can be detrimental to a student's concentration and mindset during a test. While many people may not be diagnosed with testing anxiety, the symptoms can be confused with simple nervousness and apprehension. "I find that when I do my exams, I occasionally experience

migraines and nausea" said Senior Peter Rouston.

Noteworthy is the fact that the American Test Anxiety Association found that the condition could affect as many as 20 percent of students, with another 18 percent carrying a moderate form of the condition. However, various studies and experiments have shown that there are ways to counteract the effects of test anxiety.

Though test anxiety affects a large portion of the school-going population, it can be solved through simple activities.

In a study done by Sian Beilock, a cognitive scientist at the University of Chicago, students were asked to spend 10 minutes writing about their thoughts and feelings prior to taking a test. The experiment was performed by college students in Beilock's lab and in a Chicago high school. The results showed that the scores of the students significantly improved compared to those who didn't participate in the

experiment.

Simple exercises such as these can virtually eliminate some symptoms of test anxiety. As the semester exams near, students should study and stay confident. Being calm and confident during the test can help test-takers perform as well as they should.




The past years of Magruder track and field the female sprinters have always been so close to the state title throughout the indoor and outdoor season.


"The girls have a chance of getting a state title", says Coach Gene. With majority of the competition gone from the previous years there is a chance for the girls to finally get what


