Did you know about the Academic Common Market as a way to save on tuition? What is The Academic Common Market (ACM)?: The Academic Common Market (ACM) is a tuition-savings program that operates on the premise that if *public* institutions (not including private institutions) in a student's home state do not offer a degree program major (undergraduate or graduate) that a student intends on pursuing, then s/he may attend

a participating ACM out-of-state institution offering the degree of interest through the ACM and be granted a waiver of out-of-state tuition charges. Visit the MHEC website and select the link for Academic Common Market.

Junior | Senior Year Timeline for pursuing College or Career:

Spring of junior year:

- Earn the best grades possible.
- Review senior year course selections.
- Explore options. *Career or College?* Tour college campuses and/or vocational schools and talk with admissions representatives, professors, and students. If unable to visit, take a virtual tour on the school website. Research college admission requirements. Use Naviance to create a college list.
- Plan for College Admissions tests. If the ACT or SAT are required for schools of interest, prepare to take the test.
- Explore summer jobs, internships and pre-college programs and complete SSL hours.
- Work on your resume.
- Complete the Northwest Brag Sheet in Naviance (survey) and request teacher college recommendations.

Summer before senior year:

- Register and attend College Career Summer Workshops.
- Preview the Common Application and/or Coalition Application essay prompts.
- Register with the <u>NCAA Eligibility Center</u> if you are planning to play a Division I or Division II sport in college.
- Research scholarship opportunities. Resources available on the Northwest website.

Fall Senior Year:

- Narrow down your college list and register for college tests. 6-10 colleges including target, safety, and reach schools.
- Secure letters of recommendation (Students are encouraged to ask teachers in June prior to senior year).
- Focus on college essays and college applications.
- Apply for financial aid with the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) application opens Oct 1.
- Research your colleges to determine if the CSS Profile is needed for financial aid consideration.
- Use high school resources to research local and national scholarships.
- Submit your college applications by the college deadlines.
- Submit your <u>Transcript Request Form</u> linked from our Counseling web page. **Select Jump to Transcript Requests** (upper right area of the web page).
- Maintain strong grades in high school courses. Colleges will ask for senior grades!

- **Step 1:** Think about why you want to go to college or pursue a particular career.
- **Step 2:** Decide what is important to you in a college or trade school.
- **Step 3:** Gather information about the schools you are considering.

The 4-Year College Plan: The Application Process at Northwest High School:

Connecting online using Naviance | Student, eDocs, the Common App & the Coalition App...

EDocs is an online feature linked to a student's Naviance | Student account. **EDocs** is a streamlined college application process for Northwest staff and students. **Staff use of EDocs includes:**

□ **Electronic transmission** – the ability for school staff to transmit transcripts, recommendations and supporting

college application documents electronically to colleges and universities, including electronic submission to schools who are members of the Common App or Coalition App.

Northwest seniors and parents will use Naviance | Student account for:

- Application Tracking the ability for students to keep track of colleges where they have applied. Seniors applying to schools using the Common App will also be required to match their Common App account in their Naviance | Student account. No matching is required when applying using the Coalition App.
- Transcript Tracking the ability for students to view the status of transcript requests for college applications and scholarships.
- Letter of Recommendations the ability for students to request college recommendations and view the status of those requests

The College Application, Letters of Recommendations & Transcript Requests:

THE COLLEGE APPLICATION:

College applications are the responsibility of the student. Many colleges and universities require students to submit online applications. Students may also opt to use the **Common Application**, which allows students to apply to multiple schools through one online application. For more information on The Common Application, visit <u>commonapp.org</u>. The **Coalition Application** is a set of free online college planning tools that helps students learn about, prepare for and apply to college. Using the **MyCoalition** platform, students are able to apply to multiple colleges who are members of the Coalition. For more information on the **Coalition for Access, Affordability, and Success**, visit <u>coalitionforcollegeaccess.org</u>.

There is no direct phone number access for **The Common App**. The Application Solutions Center is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It has an average response time of under one hour. Visit <u>commonapp.org/help-center</u> web page for a link to Applicant Solutions. There are video postings and Frequently Asked Questions available on the **Coalition** web pages. Email questions to <u>info@coalitionapp.org</u>.

Schools will clearly state on their website the options available for completing their application. Look at the structure of each option before deciding which option to choose.

- Common Application or Coalition Application
- <u>Black Common Application</u>. Apply to any/all partner members for one fee.
- School-specific application.

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION:

For letters of recommendation, students will be required to complete the <u>Student Self-Evaluation</u> <u>Questionnaire</u> which is a survey in Naviance | *Student*. Counselors and teachers will use survey responses to write college and scholarship recommendations. Students can also download the questionnaire from the Counseling web page and provide hard copies of their responses to teachers and their counselor for letters of recommendation. Students always have the option of making an appointment with their counselor to discuss their recommendation and college choices. <u>Important note:</u> If the recommender is not a current Northwest HS staff member, please provide the recommender with the email address for the college and/or career school admissions office or an address for mailing their recommendation. Their recommendation must be sent directly to the school where you are applying.

- One or two teacher letters of recommendation and a counselor recommendation
- Teachers from grades 11 or 12 preferred
- Core subject teachers are preferred
- Ask teachers personally before you make the official request in Naviance
- Make your request at the end of spring semester
- Supplemental recommendations may be accepted by cannot replace the required teacher and counselor recommendation(s)
- Remember to thank your recommenders

TRANSCRIPT REQUESTS:

For **transcript requests**, students will be required to complete the <u>College & Scholarship Transcript</u> <u>Request Form</u> which now includes the *Release of Records & Early Decision Acknowledgement Form*. The counseling web page has a <u>link</u> to these Google Forms along with a PDF version available to download. Follow the instructions on the form for processing.

The Essay:

- Be aware of supplemental essays that may be required to complete the college application

Here are our top five tips for you to share with your juniors for keeping a journal to generate ideas for the college essay:

- Ask yourself, "What do colleges know about me?" After that, ask, "What else do I want them to know? Why?" Think traits and characteristics, rather than experiences. (Are you serious? Industrious? Resourceful? Creative? Funny? Hard Working? Analytical?) Write the answers down in the first page of your journal.
- Once you know what you want readers to learn about you, start thinking about stories or experiences that illustrate those characteristics. You will write about them in this journal as often as you want, with as many details as you need to remember the experiences you choose to include in your journal.
- Think of your journal entries as though they were quick snapshots from your cell phone something you might post on Facebook or a photo-sharing website. Their purpose is to jog your memory and remind you of an experience, not to capture it in spectacular detail.
- If you try to record everything that happens on your trip to the Grand Canyon or every life-changing insight from your summer job as a swim teacher, you will give up after a day or two. On the other hand, if you jot down, "Sunset with Brian and Sarah. The sky looked like it was painted in watercolor," you will remember that evening forever.
- If you scribble, "Ava finally put her head in the water! I threw the red plastic ring to the bottom of the pool, and she went straight down for it," you will also remember the way the sun hit the diving board and the woman in the lounge chair who sat by the pool all summer with iced tea and a trashy novel.

Here are 5 basic rules you should try to adhere to:

Rule #1: Always include a subject and include the recipient's name in the greeting

<u>Rule #2</u>: Do not write in ALL CAPITALS! Writing in all capitals may convey that you are shouting in your message; and nobody likes to be yelled at! Consider other ways to get your message across and communicate its importance. Using all capitals is not appropriate and can trigger an unintended response.

<u>Rule #3:</u> Be mindful when using abbreviations and emoticons. Save abbreviations like LOL and IDK for text messages with friends. Some may not understand your abbreviations and they are not professional.

Rule #4: Think, review, and proofread before you send! Ask yourself "is this okay to send?" and "did I reread and review this?"

<u>Rule #5:</u> Do not send if...

- The email can be interpreted in a bad way
- The email could get you in trouble

<u>The College Application & Testing Information:</u> <u>Test Optional - Test Blind - Test Flexible Admissions Policies:</u>

If a college or university has a **test-optional admissions policy**, that means they allow all or some applicants to decide whether to submit SAT or ACT scores as part of their application. It does not mean that the schools are not interested in seeing all applicants' performance and potential - but if a student does not submit their scores, it will not be considered in the application review. If scores are submitted, they could be used as part of admissions review.

If a college or university has a **test-blind admissions policy**, test scores are not considered for admissions review even if they are submitted.

If you're not a good standardized test-taker but don't want to simply not submit a test score, there are test flexible schools. **Test flexible** colleges or universities allow students to choose which type of test (or tests) they'd like to submit with their application.

COLLEGE TESTING REGISTRATION & SCORE REPORTS TO COLLEGES:

SAT or ACT Registration. If you plan to apply to any four-year colleges, you should consider taking the ACT or SAT during the spring of your junior year and/or fall of your senior year. Check with each college or university where you plan to apply to review their testing policy and requirements. Some four-year colleges may be test optional or test blind for application review. Research your colleges to determine the best test plan for you.

Students will be responsible for requesting electronic score reports be sent to colleges directly from College Board (SAT) or ACT. Registration for both the <u>ACT</u> and <u>SAT</u> is online. If there is a need for financial assistance to cover registration costs, see the College Career Information Center staff for help with the waiver request process. FEE WAIVERS are available for students who meet specified eligibility requirements. COLLEGE REGISTRATION INCLUDES THE SCHOOL CODE. THE SCHOOL CODE FOR NORTHWEST HIGH SCHOOL IS 210-589. The SAT Test Center Code for Northwest is 21-298.

Registration dates for remaining ACT & SAT Test Dates (2022-2023 school year)

The **May 6** SAT has a regular registration deadline of **April 7**. The **June 3** SAT has a regular registration deadline of **May 4**. **2023-2024** College Board anticipates an **August 26**, **2023 test date** with a registration deadline of **July 28**. The **June 10** ACT has a regular registration deadline of **May 5**. The **July 15** ACT has a regular registration deadline of **June 16**. **2023-2024 ACT test dates and registration** information can be found at <u>https://www.act.org/</u>

College Testing Registration Fee Waivers *may be available for first-time test takers with waiver eligibility*. Visit the college career web page and select <u>college & career testing information</u> for details on how to request a waiver.

Montgomery College & College Level Placement Testing. Student's applying to MC are encouraged to take the <u>Accuplacer</u> which determines a student's ability to take college-level coursework. MC offers multiple placement options, including transcript review for Accuplacer exemption.

Advanced Placement Courses & the Exam:

AP exam myth #3: You must get a 5 in order to receive college credit

Even if your intended school does accept college credit, you might think that you need to score a 5 in order to receive that credit. This is not always the case. For some schools and subjects, you might be able to receive a 4 or even a 3 in order to earn college credit. Before sitting for the exam, research what your schools of interest require in terms of AP exam scores. This information might help you decide how you want to prioritize your study time for the exam.

Students enrolled in an AP course should take the exam for that course. Financial assistance may be available for students who qualify. For current year exam dates, details visit **collegeboard.org** and select **AP**.

Enlisting in the Military: The U.S. Air Force, Army, Navy and Marines provide job training in many fields, as well as opportunities for enlistees to take some college-level courses. The services can also help you build a college fund (Montgomery GI Bill). The U.S. Coast Guard may also be an option with limited enlistment.

The **National Guard** consists of two components: The Army National Guard (ARNG) and the Air National Guard (ANG). The mission of the National Guard is to serve the state in times of natural disaster or civil disturbance, and the nation in times of war. Flexible scheduling is offered to serve along with educational benefits.

Each service has its own enlistment qualifications. Local recruiter information is available on our <u>website</u>. For additional information regarding the military, visit <u>www.militarycareers.com</u>. Enlistment will also require taking the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) test. The ASVAB is offered at the high school level at no cost and no obligation to the military.

Exploring Careers & the Workforce Options:

Apprenticeship Programs: For students interested in learning a trade or receiving a certification or license, there are apprenticeship programs. An apprenticeship is a paid period of training that allows you to learn a particular skill or set of skills. Resources for apprenticeships:

Entering the Workforce: The workforce provides students with an opportunity to earn a salary right after high school. LOR: Letter of Recommendation

Glossary of Career, College & Financial Aid Terms:

- **Early Decision:** A plan in which students submit a college application in November or December and learn of their acceptance in December or January. If admitted, the students MUST <u>WITHDRAW</u> their other applications and accept the school's offer. You may only apply for early decision to one school therefore; only use this plan if you have no doubts about where you want to attend college.
- Early Action: Differs from early decision in that students are not required to accept admission or withdraw applications from other schools if accepted. Students may submit applications to more than one early action program.
- **Early Admission:** A program in which a college accepts high school students to enroll before they graduate from high school. Admissions standards are more stringent for early admissions.
- **Early Notification:** A program in which applicants must file their papers by December 1 in order to receive an admission decision by February 1.
- **Open Admissions:** A policy adopted by a number of institutions that allows virtually all applicants to enroll.
- **Priority Admissions:** Applicants are given the strongest consideration for admission, student housing, scholarships and financial aid.
- Rolling Admissions: Ongoing admission committee review of a student's application.
- Candidate Notification Date or Common Reply Date: The date by which a college notifies a student of their decision, usually April 15.
- **Candidate Reply Date:** The date by which a student must notify the college of his/her enrollment intentions. Acceptance withdrawn by the college if the applicant fails to reply. (The date is usually May 1.)
- The Common Application: A college application accepted by 125+ colleges/universities available on line @ commonapp.org
- **Cooperative Education:** A combination of classroom study and work experience directly related to classroom study.
- **Deferral:** A term used to identify early-decision candidates denied admission in December but considered for regular admissions.
- **Deferment:** A policy by which a college allows a student to defer enrollment for one year. If notification is given, a tuition deposit space is reserved. Not used for academic study elsewhere.
- **Demonstrated interest:** One of the admissions criteria used by some colleges and universities. The term refers to ways that an applicant shows he or she is serious about enrolling at a given college.
- Award Letter: A notice from a financial aid office to a financial aid applicant that specifies the financial aid programs dollar amount of each financial aid award.
- Bursar: The on-campus office where you pay your tuition and associated school fees.
- **Cost of Attendance**: The total sum of a student's tuition, room/board, books, supplies, transportation, associated loan fees, and any other expenses.
- CSS/Financial Aid Profile: The CSS profile is a College Board financial aid form that collects information for colleges to award non-federal student aid funds. This form is not required by all colleges.
- Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA): Federal government application is completed to determine federal financial aid such as grants, loans, and work-study.
- FSA ID: The electronic signature required to submit the FAFSA. FAFSA applicants create their own FSA ID (one for the student applicant and one for at least one parent) as part of the application process.
- **Expected Family Contribution (EFC)**: Generated as a result of the FAFSA submission, this indicates how much money the federal government estimates a student and family can afford to contribute towards the year's college costs.
- Student Aid Report (SAR): The document received after the FAFSA is processed which will include all the applicant's responses from FAFSA submission. The applicant can review the SAR and make corrections if needed.
