Dear Parents:

How can you help your middle schooler to become a better reader? Encourage him or her to make reading for pleasure a regular habit. This is not always the easiest task to undertake...students in middle school often prefer other activities to reading. You can support your child in developing the reading habit by scheduling a regular time for reading each day, visiting bookstores and libraries together, and having reading discussions with your child.

Make this an enjoyable family routine...take the time to read together. Let your child see that you are a reader by regularly reading books, newspapers, or articles at home. Make visiting the library or bookstore a pleasant family field trip. Share your excitement about reading by talking about the interesting things you have read about. Ask your child to share what he or she is reading with you.
