Wells, Rosemary. Abdul. Dial Pr, [1975].

Note: The old mother camel's new baby, Abdul, is a strange looking creature that causes his owner all sorts of problems.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Bunny cakes : a Max and Ruby picture book. New York: Dial, [1997].

Note: Max makes an earthworm cake for Grandma's birthday and help Ruby with her angel surprise cake. At the store, the grocer can't read all of the shopping list, until Max solves the problem by drawing a picture.

Wells, Rosemary. Bunny cakes : a Max and Ruby picture book. New York: Puffin, [2000].

Wells, Rosemary. Bunny money. New York: Viking, [2000].

Note: Max and Ruby spend so much on emergencies while shopping for Grandma's birthday presents, that they just barely have enough money left for gifts.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Edward unready for school. New York: Dial Bks, [1995].

Note: Edward, a shy, young bear unready for play school, feels out of place surrounded by students who are ready, busy, and happy.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Edward's overwhelming overnight. New York: Dial Bks, [1995].

Note: Edward's parents tell him that because of the snow he will have to stay overnight with his friend Anthony, but Edward finds this overwhelming.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Emily's first 100 days of school. New York: Hyperion Books for Children, [2000].

Note: Starting with number one for the first day of school, Emily learns the numbers to one hundred in many different ways.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Hazel's amazing mother. Puffin Pied Piper, [1989].

Note: When Hazel and her beloved doll Eleanor are set upon by bullies, Hazel's mother comes to the rescue in a surprising way.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Max cleans up. New York: Viking, [2000].

Note: Max's big sister Ruby is determined to help him clean up his messy room, but he keeps rescuing things that she wants to throw away.

Wells, Rosemary. Max's chocolate chicken. Reprint ed. New York: Dial, [1999].

Note: Max and his sister Ruby go on an egg hunt and vie with each other for the prize--a chocolate chicken.

Wells, Rosemary. Max's Christmas. New York: Dial Bks, [1986].

Note: Despite his sister Ruby's admonitions, Max waits up on Christmas Eve to see Santa Claus coming down the chimney.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Max's dragon shirt. New York: Viking Bks, [2000].

Note: On a shopping trip to the department store, Max's determination to get a dragon shirt leads him away from his distracted sister and into trouble.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Morris's disappearing bag : a Christmas story. Dial Pr, [1975].

Note: Everyone in Morris's family is pleased with his Christmas present but Morris.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Noisy Nora. Dial Pr, [1973].

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Ruby's beauty shop. New York: Viking, [2002].

Note: Louise and Ruby use Louise's "Deluxe Beauty Kit" to give Max a make-over, but when Grandma calls to schedule her own make-over, she makes an appointment with Max.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Shy Charles. New York: Puffin, [1992].

Note: Being painfully timid and shy does not keep a young mouse from rescuing his babysitter in an emergency situation.

\*E W

Wells, Rosemary. Stanley and Rhoda. New York: Dial Press, [1978].

Note: In three episodes a brother and sister deal with Rhoda's untidy room, a bee sting, and a baby sitter.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Timothy goes to school. Dial Press, [1981].

Note: Timothy learns about being accepted and making friends during the first week of his first year at school.

E W

Wells, Rosemary. Yoko. New York: Hyperion Books for Children, [1998].

Note: When Yoko brings sushi to school for lunch, her classmates make fun of what she eats--until one of them tries it for himself.

Wells, Rosemary. Yoko writes her name. New York, N.Y: Hyperion Books for Children, [2008].

Note: Kindergartner Yoko not only learns to write her letters and numbers in English, she shows her teacher and fellow students how to write their names using Japanese calligraphy.
