



## 2009 Mandatory Summer Reading for Incoming 9<sup>th</sup> grade honors and Pre-IB Albert Einstein High School's English Department

All students must read the short story "The Scarlett Ibis" ([http://209.184.141.5/westwood/academ/depts/dpteng/L-Coker/VirtualEnglish/Englsih%20I/English%20Ia/scarlet\\_ibis.html](http://209.184.141.5/westwood/academ/depts/dpteng/L-Coker/VirtualEnglish/Englsih%20I/English%20Ia/scarlet_ibis.html)) and three critical essays about the story, (<http://www.answers.com/topic/the-scarlet-ibis-story-7>).

After reading the story and the essays, students must complete three assignments. These assignments are **due on the 2<sup>nd</sup> day** of school. Additionally, there will be a writing assignment completed in class during the first week of school. The assignments will count for up to 5 % of students' first quarter grade.

### ASSIGNMENTS TO COMPLETE OVER THE SUMMER:

1. Take 5 Cornell Notes on 1 character's traits in "The Scarlett Ibis": Character/Quote/Trait Analysis. Identify five passages that you feel help to develop a character. When looking for examples of characterization, include passages that show how the character thinks, speaks, acts, and how other characters view this character. Write the passage in the left hand column, documenting the page number of the quote. In the right hand column, write a brief explanation of what you feel the passage reveals about the character's personality. An example from J.D. Salinger's *Catcher in the Rye* is provided:

*Catcher in the Rye*  
by J.D. Salinger

#### Cornell Notes

Character	Passage	Explanation
1. HOLDEN	"I know he's dead! Don't you think I know that? I can still like him, though, can't I? Just because somebody's dead, you don't just stop liking them... especially if they were about a thousand times nicer than the people you know that are alive and all" (17).	Holden is talking about his brother Allie. Holden seems to be having a lot of trouble dealing with his brother's death, and it has affected the way he feels about the people in his life.

2. Take 5 Cornell Notes on the plot: Plot/Quote/Explanation or Interpretation. Identify 5 passages that clearly express the plot. Your examples should focus on the exposition, rising and falling action, climax and resolution. Write the passage in the left hand column, documenting the page number of the quote. In the right hand column, write a brief explanation of what you feel the passage reveals about the plot. See formatted example:

3. Take 5 Cornell Notes on 1 critical essay's perspective on "The Scarlett Ibis". Choose passages that focus on the perspective of the critic.
