The Classroom Corner

Preschool Update

Preschool was busy during November as they continued to learn about fall and all the changes they observed during that time of year. They read a number of books about apples and leaves and enjoyed all the math activities during the Fall Frolic event on November 4th. Some of the Fall Frolic activities were: fishing for apples and then counting how many they had; sorting leaves by big/small and by color; looking for and finding numbers hidden in hay stacks; weighing fall items such as pumpkins, acorns and leaves to discover which were heavy and which were light; and, measuring themselves using ears of corn. There were many other activities that they enjoyed as well and it made learning math so much fun!

A big "Thank You" goes out to all the wonderful families who came in for the parent conferences and meetings. It was great to see everyone and to discuss the students' progress.

Also in November, they learned about Thanksgiving as they talked about: all the types of foods they ate, what it meant to "give thanks", and for what they were thankful. They recorded what they were thankful for on a graph located next to the Showcase at school.

December was a special time for Preschool, with so many wonderful themes to explore. We began our curriculum unit of "Store," by creating multiple dramatic play areas in our classrooms, including stores for toys, clothing, books, music, and groceries. The children enjoyed using the play shopping carts, cash registers, and money; and happily made their pretend purchases. We read theme-based books such as *George's Store at the Shore*, *Sheep in a Shop*, *Corduroy*, and *Llama, Llama, Mad at Mama*, about the difficulties of shopping for and with children!

As the time changed and the days grew shorter, we studied "Day and Night." We read *Goodnight Moon* and *What the Sun Sees/What the Moon Sees*. We sang "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star." We did lots of Nighttime artwork, and identified differences between day and night.

Preschool students also learned about and celebrated the seasonal holidays of Hanukkah, Christmas, and Kwanzaa. We 'lit' candles on menorahs and kinaras, spun dreidels, tasted latkes, and decorated trees and gingerbread men. We read about the symbols of all the holidays, and sang lots of holiday songs.

As we move into January, we are welcoming the New Year and new season of "Winter." *SNOW* provides the exciting topic for lots of wonderful books, including *Snowmen at Night*, *The Jacket I Wear in the Snow*, *The Snowy Day*, and *Snowball Fight!* The students are having great sensory experiences with cotton snow, shaving cream snow, paint snow, and real

snow! We are learning about snowflakes, and about melting snow.

Also in January, we honored Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. by discussing our own dreams for helping people. We will wrap up our "Shopping" unit, and move on to learn about "Restaurant." We are looking forward to pizza kitchens, Chinese restaurants, ice cream parlors, and fast food joints!

Elementary School Update

The elementary department had a busy fall with all kinds of seasonal activities. Both classes had a wonderful time at the Fall Frolic (Math Day) set up in the gym. Everyone seemed to have at least one favorite game to play! Many of the activities reinforced Alt-MSA testing objectives including identifying shapes and patterns. Ms. Rowe's class author study in reading for the second quarter is Lois Ehlert. They started out by reading her book, *Red Leaf, Yellow Leaf*, which tied in nicely with the onset of fall. Mrs. Robinson's class is continued with reading their chapter book, *Charlotte's Web*, as part of the Alt-MSA Testing. They focused on vocabulary, characters, and the main idea of the text. In social studies, Ms. Rowe's class studied the topic of, 'Geography: Changes in the Way We Live'. This has tied in nicely with the study of Native American Indians, particularly the Accohannock Tribe who were early settlers on the Eastern Shore of the Chesapeake Bay. They have compared their lifestyle, based on the geography of the region, and the students' current lifestyle in Wheaton, Maryland. Their community trips also have supported this study as they have gone to the Takoma Park Food Co-op and looked at the harvest foods displayed as well as aspects of the community and services available to the people who live there. Mrs. Robinson's class has been studying life in the early history of America. The highlight of this unit was a virtual field trip to Plymouth Plantation in Massachusetts to observe life there as described by pilgrims and a Wampanoag Indian!



Mrs. Robinson's class is continuing Alt-MSA testing with science topics such as the sun as the energy source for plant growth and the mass of whole objects compared to their parts.

In science, Ms. Rowe's students learned about the properties of magnets. In social studies, their activities revolved around transportation in their community such as looking at various vehicles used for service and personal travel. Their author study continues to focus on Lois Ehlert, and they are currently reading *Growing Vegetable Soup*.

Mrs. Robinson's upper elementary students completed their social studies lessons on the history of the United States with research on the common aspects of various ethnic and religious holidays that citizens celebrate at this time of year. They continued to use their observation skills during science lessons as they explored topics such as the mass of objects and the types of motion. In math, they practiced telling time and counting money. In reading class, they finished the chapter book, *Charlotte's Web* by E. B. White, and checked to see if they had made correct predictions about this story. Reading, Math and Science continues to be the overall focus of their instructional program as they move further into the winter months ahead.

Middle School Update



Ms. Cathy Kleiler's class had a very productive fall community trip to Meadowside Nature Center. They started with an outdoor visit to the Raptor Aviaries to see the owls, hawks and the American Bald Eagle. Then, they went indoors to the Curiosity Corner Room to view the turtles, snakes and unusual stick spiders. Their favorite part was the room depicting the life of the Eastern Woodland Indian. There they tried on Native American outfits, sat in a tepee and touched a bear-skin. Lastly, they went into a cave area to see the world from a fish's point of view. Ms. Cathy's class had a great time trying out a new bowling **continued on next page**

alley. They went to the AMF Shady Grove Lanes during their Community Based Instruction (CBI) time in early December. They were greeted with a warm welcome. At 10:30 in the morning, they had the entire bowling alley to themselves. Cartoons and music videos were projected onto the large wall above the lanes to entertain the students waiting for their turn. Each student bowled a terrific game, with strikes and spares.

Mr. Rob Tarloff's class has been very busy. In science, they studied ecosystems and how little changes can make a big difference. In math, they studied addition and subtraction, and now are moving on to probability. In reading, they are continuing to read, *The Secret Garden*. All the students are doing well following the class routine. Also, they are using a variety of mobility equipment such as gait trainers and bicycles.

High School Update

The 13th Annual Thanksgiving Luncheon hosted by Mrs. Moore's class (D-5) was once again a total sell-out success! It took 50 pounds of turkey to serve over 62 meals this year! The high school students in D-5 spent most of November planning for the annual project by selecting the menu and shopping for the groceries and paper goods needed to prepare the traditional meal of turkey with stuffing, mashed potatoes, gravy, candied sweet potatoes, green bean casserole, rolls, corn bread and punch. By integrating cooking class, occupational therapy and speech class, the students not only cooked the whole meal, but also made delicious apple and pumpkin pies for dessert! The beautiful menus and wall decorations were designed especially for the event in art class and helped to set the fall theme. This annual project gives the students a

wonderful opportunity to incorporate reading, math and social studies with Fundamental Life Skills. Thank you to all of the students, staff and parents who supported our event!

The students were very busy this past holiday season as the holiday themes were incorporated into their academic studies. Under the leadership of their substitute teacher, Ms. Weiss, the students in Ms. Donnally's class went shopping to the Dollar Tree store to select a holiday gift from their Wish Lists. The students in Ms. Moore's class used Picture Communication Symbols to write out their shopping lists for gifts for their family and friends. They shopped at K-Mart, wrapped their gifts, and made homemade almond bark to share with their loved ones. Ms. Reed's class learned about holiday celebrations around the world by listening to music and viewing videos.

Healthy Minds and Active Bodies

In our physical education program, December was a very busy month as students worked very hard at throwing and catching. Activities such as volleyball and Nucomb (a version of volleyball where you catch and throw) also helped to develop these abilities. In addition, students had the opportunity to work on object and color recognition skills. Later in the month, students worked on their shopping skills by manipulating shopping carts in order to complete different tasks. The preschool students began using 3 step directions and practicing turn taking. While the school age students worked on invasion games such as capture the flag as they had to work as a team and practice evasion skills. It was a great December!

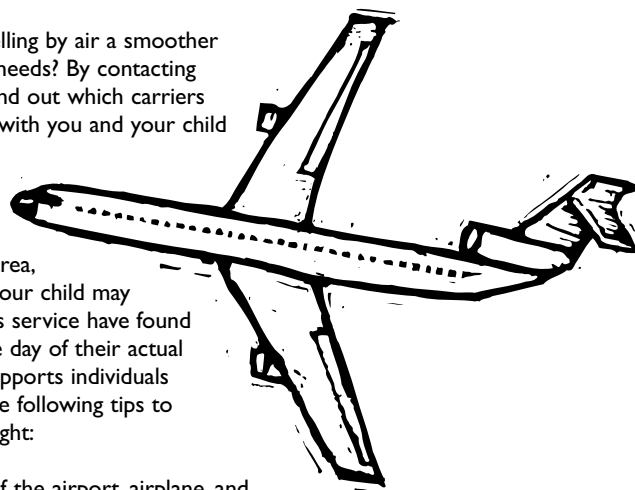

The Therapeutic Touch

Traveling by air with children with special needs

Did you know that you can make travelling by air a smoother experience for your child with special needs? By contacting airlines at your local airport, you can find out which carriers are willing to accommodate and work with you and your child in making flying a pleasant experience.

Certain airlines can arrange a practice run, which may include going through security, boarding a plane, checking out the baggage claim area, and answering any questions you and your child may have. Many parents who have used this service have found that their child was less anxious on the day of their actual departure. Pathfinders, a group that supports individuals with autism and their families, offers the following tips to lessen the stress of your child's next flight:



1. Show your child pictures or video of the airport, airplane, and your destination - ask your child's teacher or therapist to help
2. Prepare your child for the security process - explain why they have to relinquish shoes and electronic devices, and that they will get them back
3. Do a practice run at the airport, as explained above
4. Pre-board - ask the airline if you are eligible so that you can get settled before the crowd
5. Pick a preferred seat - consider if a window or aisle seat is preferable, keep in mind that the very back of the plane is noisy
6. Take along a car seat - it may help keep your child in their seat
7. Stay busy - bring favorite toys, activities, snacks, and comforting items
8. Take care of those ears - consider chewing gum, using ear plugs or headphones

The Way We Move

There are 38 students enrolled in the school-aged program at Stephen Knolls School and every student is given multiple opportunities for mobility throughout the school day. But did you know that on average each student spends more than 40 minutes a day working on their mobility skills, either by walking, standing or using other adapted equipment. Currently, there are 12 students who use the treadmill for at least 10 minutes at a time, at least once a week. That is 33% of the school who uses the treadmill. We encourage all of our families to work with you children on their mobility at home. There are many easy things that you can do. For example, you may have them help to get dressed or get up from their chairs. If you have any questions about what you can do, please contact the school aged therapy department.

Connect Ed

The automated phone messages you receive from MCPS and Stephen Knolls School are set up for you to receive information about your child's school. This can be emergency information, such as a snow day, or event information, such as an upcoming PSA meeting. We do know that getting a recorded voice message isn't always fun but it is important that you are aware of what is happening with the school system. 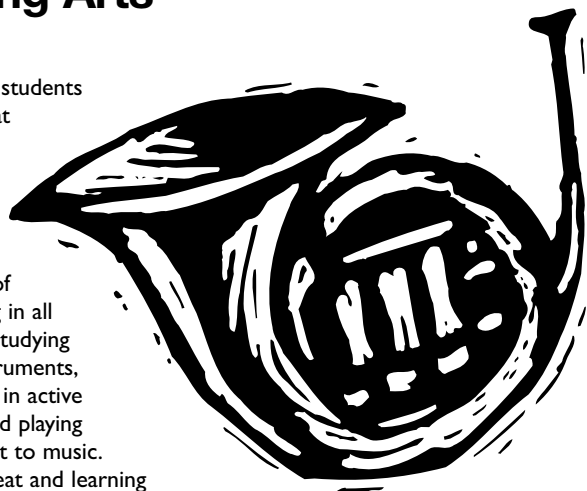
Music

The Music Program at Stephen Knolls is in full swing. We have a great deal of musical enrichment happening in all of our music classes. We are studying the names and sounds of instruments, music texture and taking part in active listening using visual guides and playing instruments in accompaniment to music.

Students are moving to the beat and learning about the concepts of dance. Music has been selected to reflect the age and learning needs within various classes.

The students listened, moved, and played instruments along with music for the winter holidays and from the *Nutcracker*. The students also listened and responded to music written for celebrations around the world.



Preschool Art

For the preschool art class, it should be time for the students to put away the clay ornaments that they made for holiday decorations. They were so proud and excited to paint them before winter break. Remember, if there have been any accidents, you may use white liquid glue such as Elmer's to reattach any broken pieces, just let them dry in a quiet spot for a couple of hours. The next big unit on which the preschool students will be working is about printing and stamping. Parents can reinforce these activities at home by making fingerprints and handprints with their child. One of the easiest ways to do this is to color a fingertip with a washable marker, then stamp onto paper. Older kids enjoy connecting the dots to make animals and faces. Another great activity as the weather starts to get colder is snow painting. Start by finding some empty spray bottles, and then fill them with water and food coloring. You can also use a little bit of tempera paint or unsweetened Kool-Aid for the coloring. After the next snow fall, take the bottles outside and have fun with your child painting on the snow. All that squirting means this is also a great activity to increase hand strength.

Claire's Gourmet Food Fundraiser

The annual Claire's Foods fundraiser we held this fall had another successful year. Ms. Roseann Robb and Ms. Tricia Skelly report that we raised almost \$1,000.00 to benefit our school. 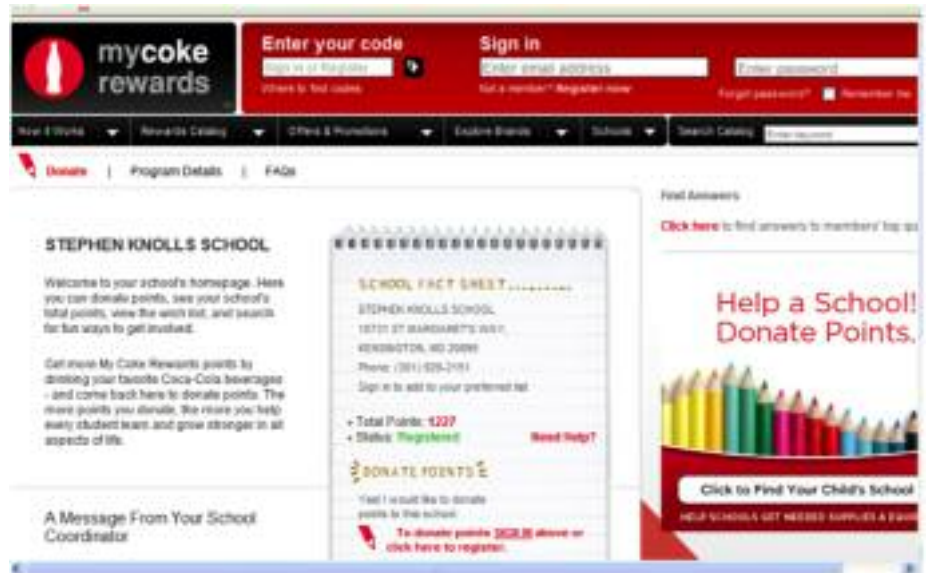
