POSITIVE BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTIONS AND SUPPORTS (PBIS)

We are continuing with PBIS this school year. PBIS is a systems approach to enhancing the capacity of schools to educate all children by developing research-based, school wide, and classroom discipline systems. PBIS is a team-based process for systemic problem solving, planning, and evaluation. Please review the attached **RCF School-wide Expectations Matrix** as it will explain what being respectful, responsible and ready to learn looks like in our cafeteria, playground, dismissal, arrival, bathrooms, bus, hallways and classrooms. Consistent behavior will be recognized. When all students use habits of effectiveness such as being proactive, beginning with the end in mind, putting first things first, thinking win-win, seeking first to understand and then to be understood, synergizing, and sharpening the saw, everyone will be a productive member of our school community. If you have questions about the **RCF School-wide Expectations Matrix** or the habits of effectiveness, please contact your child's teacher, the assistant principal or the principal.

Classroom teachers and other staff members will recognize students by for exhibiting appropriate behaviors with **PAW PRINTS**. All staff members are expected to correct inappropriate student behavior. Inappropriate behaviors are categorized by the levels listed below.

Level 1 – insubordination, disruptive behavior

Level 2 – chronic misbehavior, defiance, inappropriate language, property misuse, cheating, teasing, spitting

Level 3 - chronic misbehavior, fighting, overt defiance, weapons (including look-alike), abusive/inappropriate language, bullying, sexual harassment, forgery, theft, vandalism, bomb threat, alcohol/drug use

In addition to the **RCF School-wide Expectations Matrix**, we would like to highlight the following items:

- **PTA & School Events outside the student day**: Students must be chaperoned and accompanied by a parent or responsible adult during events. There are no unsupervised “drop-offs” of children at PTA & School Events.
- **Bullying**: If you feel your child is being bullied, please contact an administrator to discuss the issue and to receive the “Bullying, Harassment, or Intimidation Reporting Form” (MCPS Form 230-35).
- **Suspensions**: Out of school suspensions may only be given when it is determined by the principal that a behavior is *disruptive* and *detrimental* to the operation of the school. Please review the “Major Infractions and Interventions” information at the end of this document as well as the 2010-2011 A Student’s Guide to Rights and Responsibilities in MCPS that was distributed on the first week of school. MAJOR INFRACTIONS AND INTERVENTIONS

Staff will use the student referral forms to communicate *serious* infraction and *major* concerns to the homeroom teacher, administration, and parents. Parents will be contacted by school staff and notified of serious incidents or recurring problematic areas. There is no after-school detention program at Rock Creek Forest. However, in certain situations, parents may be contacted so students may stay after school to complete community service or complete class work missed due to an office referral.

INFRACTIONS REQUIRING POLICE REFERRAL AND RECOMMENDATION FOR EXPULSION

- Bomb/Facsimile Possession or Bomb Threats
- Evidence of Intent to Distribute or Distribution of Intoxicants
- Possession of Firearms, including starter guns
- Violent Physical Attack on a Student or Staff Member (requires medical attention outside of school health room)
- Weapons Used to Cause Bodily Harm/Injury

INFRACTIONS

The actions listed are forbidden and are subject to a serious consequence:

Academic Dishonesty/Plagiarism	Possession of a Knife	Theft
Bullying (including electronic bullying)	Possessing Other Weapons	Burglary
Computer Abuse	Physical Attack on a Student	Threat (verbal, electronic, written)
Vandalism	Physical Attack on a Staff Member	Verbal Abuse
Extortion	Possession of Intoxicants	Hate/Violence
Fire setting	Sexual	Gang-Related Incident
Hazing	Harassment/Offenses/Activity	

HIERARCHY OF CONSEQUENCES

1. Immediate intervention by adult on the scene to stop the infraction.
 - a. Verbal warning
 - b. Second verbal warning
 - c. Time out (in class)
 - d. Student- Teacher Discussion
 - e. Student- Teacher-Principal Conference
 - f. Student- Teacher-Principal-Parent Conference
2. Discussions and conferences with the student regarding the incident will result in consequences appropriate to the infraction (removal of privileges, making amends, community service at school, etc.).
3. The student's homeroom teacher will always be notified via the student referral form.
4. Staff and/or administrators will inform parents of major infraction by phone or in writing. When informed by writing, parents should sign and return referral form. A signature means the parent is aware of the infraction and understands the consequences for the actions/behaviors.
5. Repeated referrals and conferences may result in the development of a behavior plan or contract to modify student behavior.
6. Major infractions that are *disruptive* and *detrimental* to the operation of the school may result in:
 - a. In-school suspension (teacher provides work), supervised in the office
 - b. Out-of-school suspension
 - c. 10-day suspension with recommendation for expulsion
7. Major infractions include:
 - a. Bomb/Facsimile Possession or Bomb Threats
 - b. Evidence of Intent to Distribute or Distribution of Intoxicants
 - c. Possession of Firearms, including starter guns
 - d. Violent Physical Attack on a Student or Staff Member (requires medical attention outside of school health room)
 - e. Weapons Used to Cause Bodily Harm/Injury

Out of school suspensions may only be given when it is determined by the principal that a behavior is disruptive and detrimental to the operation of the school.

PROCEDURES FOR STUDENT APPEALS AND GRIEVANCES

If a student feels that a disciplinary action resulting from the above infractions is not fair, he/she can take the following steps:

1. Talk it over with the adult involved.
2. Talk it over with the homeroom teacher and/or counselor.
3. Make an appointment to talk with the principal. A conference will be set as soon as possible.
4. Discuss general discipline issues with Student Council.
5. All suspensions may be appealed to the principal, field supervisor of Student Services, or the Board of Education.
