## 3rd Grade Newsletter

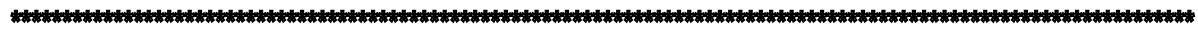

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## NEWS FLASH

### CURRICULUM UPDATE

We will continue to work on our very exciting unit in Science: **Plant and Growth Development**. During this unit, students will observe the growth of their plants from seed to flower. They seem to be enjoying this unit so far, as we will also be learning about the parts of flowers, bees, and the pollination of flowers.

In Social Studies our first unit, **Where We Live**, is under way. The children have been focusing on the elements of a map. Also, students will be working on reinforcing the economic resources and geographic features introduced in second grade. Part of our study is thus far has also included being able to identify human, capital, and natural resources as well as natural and human-made features.

We are very pleased with our spelling program; however, we know that sometimes your child may be confused with the directions of an assignment. If this is the case, please send a note or an email to their teacher, and we will be happy to make the directions more clear for them.

Also, keep in mind that third grade students are still developing skills to use when spelling. Work that is published will be checked by the teacher and have the correct spelling on it. However, some written work that comes home may contain spelling errors. As we continue teaching spelling strategies throughout the year, it is our hope that spelling errors will begin to appear less frequently. Also, we are expecting students to use the resources (word walls, word lists, words on the paper they are given, etc.) around them to help them spell words correctly. Like a sport, in order to get better, spelling must also be practiced. Remember, this is an on-going process.

Reading groups within homerooms are getting underway. With close to a ninety-minute reading block, we are able to have structured centers that contain smaller instructional groups directed by the teacher. There is also a focus on word study (spelling work) within these instructional groups. Small group instruction will focus on exposing children to a variety of text, including work with expository readings. This quarter, the concentration will be on writing in response to reading, as well as the following

comprehension strategies: making connections (text to self, text to text), visualizing, and questioning.

Students are currently using a writing rubric that addresses the six traits of writing: organization, ideas and development, word choice, voice, sentence fluency, and conventions. We are slowly breaking apart each trait so that students will be knowledgeable on the expectations of our grading. As we teach each trait, we expect students to continue to use what has been previously taught with what is currently being taught. As stated at Back to School Night, most work in writing will be kept at school in a writing portfolio, so students can use feedback on a consistent basis. If you wish to see your child's writing work, please contact the teacher.

## **Boooo!**

As Halloween approaches, students will be participating in poem presentations that relate to this day. They will be evaluated on their speaking skills as they present their poems to the class. **Information about this assignment will be given two weeks prior to Halloween.**

## **Homework Check**

We are pleased to announce the majority of third graders are consistently completing their homework. However, we are concerned with those children who are not completing homework on a nightly basis. Now that we are in a regular homework routine, you can expect your child to have math and spelling homework each evening. In addition to this, there may be an occasional special assignment in another subject area. Please check your child's student planner every night to be sure your child has completed all of their homework. Thank you for your support with teaching the children about the responsibility of homework.

Please note that math homework will never be graded. Our policy for math homework is to check over homework as a class. Students are asked to check their homework with a crayon or colored pencil as the teacher goes over the assignment. Questions are addressed as the teacher reviews the assignment. Math homework is meant to be practice for the skill that has been taught in class. Students can keep checked math homework at home once we have checked it in class.
