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Math Standards

In math, fifth graders are continuing to work on building their multiplication and division skills. Students will continue building on their knowledge of decimals. In order to best support students it would be helpful for students to practice basic facts at home, as well as advanced multiplication and division (multi- digit). Even if it is just ten minutes a day.

<u>% Math with Mrs. Jones</u>

5 students will...Develop understanding of statistical variability.

- <u>CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.6.SP.A.1</u>
- Recognize a statistical question as one that anticipates variability in the data related to the question and accounts for it in the answers. For example, "How old am I?" is not a statistical question, but "How old are the students in my school?" is a statistical question because one anticipates variability in students' ages.
- <u>CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.6.SP.A.2</u>
- Understand that a set of data collected to answer a statistical question has a distribution which can be described by its center, spread, and overall shape.
- <u>CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.6.SP.A.3</u>
- Recognize that a measure of center for a numerical data set summarizes all of its values with a single number, while a measure of variation describes how its values vary with a single number.
- Summarize and describe distributions.

- Display numerical data in plots on a number line, including dot plots, histograms, and box plots.
