RT Students Have a Big Hand in New Mosaic Mural

The entire Rolling Terrace student body participated in creating the mosaic mural that is to adorn the entrance to the school. According to RT art teacher Elizabeth Leighton, "Every kid placed a piece. That's a goal. If they're absent it will be hard (but) participation is everything."

Under the direction of mosaic muralist Arturo Ho, the 4th and 5th graders came up with drawings for the theme of "The Four Seasons" at Rolling Terrace. The mosaic consists of two eightfoot diameter circles which will be mounted on either side of the main entrance to the school.

Each circle is bisected by a tree with one season on each side of the circle. Fall has leaves and books fluttering down from the tree, while spring sprouts letters and flowers. Squirrels and birds scamper and flit through the scenes.

Students were assigned specific tasks by grade level, which they carried out during art classes. The Kindergartners sorted blue and green tiles by tone; first graders placed the tiles into the design, and 2nd and 3rd graders glued the tiles to the backing board.

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(Mosaic, continued from page 3) "I like that we get to work with tiles, and that it's realistic, and it doesn't have to be perfect." said Katalina Kastrong, a 3rd grader. On March 9, 1st and 2nd graders began the grouting process, spreading blue tinted mud-like grout between the tiles with sponges. Even the Pre-K students were able to contribute by using cookie cutters to stamp out shapes from clay. The pieces were fired, then glazed by the 1st graders. The handmade tiles, in the shapes of fall leaves, books, flowers, insects and alphabet letters are drifting, growing or flying throughout the four panels of the mosaic. The children completed their work on March 12 and parent volunteers then helped with the grouting.

The Mosaic Project has received a \$1250 grant from the Takoma Park Small Community Grant Program and a PTA mini-grant of \$400. The Rolling Terrace Community contributed \$524. These funds will pay for materials and the artist's fee. However, funding is still needed for

installation of the mosaic. The Department of Facilities Management will install the pieces on the exterior walls of the school later in the year. The Mosaic Committee has applied for additional funding from the Takoma Foundation, and Rolling Terrace will have a fundraising dinner on Tuesday, June 15 at Mark's Kitchen to raise money for the installation of the mosaic. 
Leadership Club Holds Helping Hands Campaign
