WHAT ARE TEXT FEATURES?



Different ways of changing and placing text to draw attention to or highlight certain points or ideas in narrative (eg bolding or boxing questions, italicizing key vocabulary, listing, bulleting, numbering).



HEADING



The Race To Save The Reefs





A heading is something that serves as a head, top, or front.





CAPTIONS





A caption is a title or explanation for a picture or illustration, esp. in a magazine.

BOLD FACE PRINT

This typeface represents the introduction of a new term.






CHART

Glossary

maki (rolls) Raw fish (or something edible) wrapped in rice.

matched 401k A 401k where an employer will match employee contributions.

Medicare 1.45% tax. Largely used to pay the sick bills for your grandma.

money factor Interest paid in a lease.

money market funds Safe investment with many perks (higher rates, check writing, etc).

mullet A fine haircut.

mutual fund manager Makes investment decisions for a particular fund.

mutual funds An investment that is comprised of various stocks, bonds, etc., bundled into some kind of group or category.

no-fault laws Your insurance carrier must pay no matter who caused the accident.

no-load fund A fund with no front- or backend loads (will still have an expense ratio). nonvintage wines Wines with no vintage (year) on the label. Grapes are from a few different years.

on-line broker Company that executes buy and sell orders for stocks, funds, etc.

out-of-pocket maximum The most you'll have to pay for a bill. Insurance picks up the

P/E ratio Price of a stock divided by the "earnings," or company's profit. (The higher the P/E, the more "expensive" the stock.)

part-year method A way to keep your money and earn interest if you work half of a year

PCP Primary care physician. The family doctor that you have to visit before you can see a specialist (in most HMOs and POS's).

pear shape cut Teardrop shaped diamond.

personal injury protection (PIP) Insurance that pays for injuries to the driver and passengers of your car. porterhouse steak Filet plus NY strip.

POS Point of service plan. Fully described on page 107.

PPO Preferred provider organization. Fully described starting on page 105.

pre-existing condition A medical condition prior to signing up for insurance.

premium The monthly payment you make to own insurance.

primary care physician See PCP.

prime rib Same cut of meat as the ribeye, but prepared differently (slow-cooked).

princess cut Square diamond.

property damage liability Insurance that pays for damages to someone else's car or property.

prospectus A book that describes a mutual fund. Good to review before buying a fund.






A drawing intended to explain how something works; a drawing showing the relation between the parts.

I think about the purpose I had for reading.
I check to see what I remember from the reading.
I revisit the text to check my understanding.
