How did the text features help you better understand the text? identify points an author makes and the supporting reasons. 	 hunt through magazines, newspapers, and online articles to locate and name text features. make a list of key words or phrases to identify the main topic of a text. Example: key words from a desert article hot, dry, sandy, cool at night, sunny, few plants, nocturnal animals 				
Language: Vocabulary	 use prior knowledge and a glossary or beginning dictionary to clarify the meaning of unknown words. ask and answer questions of a speaker to deepen understanding of an unfamiliar word. locate and use root words to determine the meaning of unknown words. 	 practice asking and answering interpretive questions using vocabulary from folktales. <u>Possible questions</u>: Which version of a folktale do you like better and why? How would changing the setting affect the story?
