GRADE 12 Summer Reading Assignment

Thoughtful analysis and critical reading are essential skills for every course in the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme.

Read the following work by the first day of school:

The Sorrow of War by Bao Ninh (Works in translation)

This work is available through the RHS English department (for summer check-out) or at local book stores, public libraries, or the RHS Media Center.

Complete the following assignments:

- 1. Read the novel carefully.
- 2. As you read, annotate carefully either by using sticky notes, writing in a purchased copy, or taking separate notes. See rubric. This novel is not written chronologically, and you will be writing a paper on it, your third paper (along with the ones for Medea and The Visit), one of which you will choose to perfect for the externally assessed Written Assignment. It is extremely hard to look through an entire novel searching for a particular scene when it could be anywhere, so take careful notes!
- 3. Contribute to a discussion. Go to schoology.com and click on "Enter code," then paste in this access code: X5ZW6-QJC2F Create your profile. Then find the discussions and add comments and responses as you read. There are four discussions, for four sections of the novel.
- 4. After you finish the novel, write down three questions that you feel could be developed into intriguing papers about this novel. Put thought into this. (15 completion points)
- 5. Visit the Vietnam Memorial downtown and/or view a movie about Vietnam. Write a one page reflection on the experience: consider your personal reaction as well as connections to world events, The Sorrow of War, other literature such as The Things They Carried, and film. Some film choices: The Anderson Platoon, Hamburger Hill, Platoon (Warning: This one's brutal), Full Metal Jacket, Cease Fire, Vietnam The Ten Thousand Day War, Apocalypse Now (This is a loose adaptation of Joseph Conrad's novel Heart of Darkness, which we will read second semester), Boys in Company C, Bat 21, 84 Charlie Mopic, Vietnam A Television History, Dear America—Letters Home from Vietnam, Siege of Firebase Gloria, The Fog of War
