Methods for Collecting Information During a Peer Visit with Reflection

Two questions to consider before choosing a method for collecting information are:

- What do I want to know?
- What method for collecting information would be most helpful to me?

If you are invited into a peer's classroom, it is important to remember to collect <u>facts</u>, not opinions. The interpretation of these facts will be discussed during the peer reflective conversation.

Methods

- 1. <u>Checklists</u> (Example)
 - Teacher responses to student responses
- 2. <u>Tally marks</u> (Example)
 - Number of techniques used to check for understanding
- 3. <u>Seating charts with symbols</u> (Example)
 - Patterns of calling on students
- 4. <u>Time notations with literal notes at certain intervals</u> (Example)
 - Pacing / Instructional time-on-task
- 5. Literal notes
