Model  TEAM TEACHING	<ul> <li>Two or more teachers simultaneously share instruction.</li> <li>Each teacher takes a turn leading instruction.</li> <li>The shared commitment of the teachers is evident.</li> <li>May include:         <ul> <li>role playing</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Advantages</li> <li>Structured to meet the needs of all students</li> <li>Active participation of both teachers increases the opportunity to address multiple learning styles</li> <li>Assists students in making connections, recording, and retrieving information</li> <li>Provides an opportunity for reinforcing key points of a discussion through repetition or restatement</li> <li>Motivates students and teachers</li> <li>Conversation between teachers engages student interest and attention</li> </ul>
	-modeling -clarifying or paraphrasing concepts	<ul> <li>Students have an opportunity to develop rapport with both teachers</li> <li>As the students' comfort levels increases so their willingness to take risks</li> </ul>
SHADOW TEACHING	• One teacher takes the lead during the class period; the other teacher reinforces or reteaches the lesson at another time of day using different strategies and materials.	<ul> <li>Provides the students an opportunity to learn material in two different ways</li> <li>Provides an additional opportunity to address students' learning styles</li> </ul>
SUPPORT TEACHING	<ul> <li>One teacher leads the lesson while the other adapts assignments, gives feedback, gathers data on progress, monitors participation, or provides small group/individual assistance.</li> <li>The teaching roles and student groupings are alternated regularly.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Creates an opportunity to provide additional assistance within a heterogeneous class</li> <li>Provides an opportunity for objective observation(s) and data collection</li> </ul>
PARALLEL GROUPS	<ul> <li>Both teachers plan and deliver the EXACT instruction simultaneously.</li> <li>The class is divided into two, separate smaller groups.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Provides for a lower student-to-teacher ratio</li> <li>Provides an opportunity for both teachers to focus more closely on the individual learning</li> <li>Provides an increased opportunity to facilitate and monitor students' problem solving and cooperative learning skills</li> <li>May be a venue for review prior to assessment</li> <li>Creates an opportunity for both teachers to observe students and collect data on student achievement</li> </ul>

Model	How It Looks	Advantages
NEEDS GROUPS	<ul> <li>One teacher conducts a review or reteaches the material to a small group of students.</li> <li>The other teacher provides extension or enrichment.</li> <li>The teaching roles and student groupings change regularly.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Provides an opportunity for students to be supported in individual areas of need</li> <li>Small group instruction allows for a different means for understanding of concepts</li> <li>Pacing of small group dictated by student needs and/or opportunity for extension of learning</li> <li>Groups are flexible; skill instruction can be rotated</li> <li>Assessment is a natural piece</li> </ul>
INTEREST GROUPS	<ul> <li>The two teachers share the role of selecting and preparing instructional materials for multiple topics.</li> <li>The students choose a topic of interest.</li> <li>The teachers share the role of supporting the student groups.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Provides students an opportunity to choose topics of interest regardless of ability level</li> <li>Motivates students for learning</li> <li>Extends opportunities for achievement</li> <li>Students develop an increased ownership in learning</li> </ul>
STATION GROUPS	<ul> <li>The content of lesson is divided into two or more independent segments.</li> <li>The class is divided into equal student groups.</li> <li>Each student group is provided equal time and opportunity to address all content.</li> <li>The teachers co-plan, but each is responsible for presenting a specific segment.</li> <li>Instruction may be structured so that students independently address one segment.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Provides lower student-to-teacher ratio</li> <li>Students with disabilities are fully integrated into the groups</li> <li>Small group structure provides an opportunity to teach multiple concepts in a short amount of time</li> </ul>
