ONLINE PRAXIS CORE PREP CLASS-IT'S FREE!

The Maryland State Department of Education requires that individuals earn a bachelor's or master's degree and certification in the content area they will teach and pass the necessary Praxis exams. Some universities require that applicants pass the Praxis Core before being accepted into graduate programs.



CAREER DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

The American Association of University Women (AAUW) Career Development Grants provide funding to women who hold a bachelor's degree and are preparing to advance or change careers or reenter the workforce. Primary consideration is given to women of color and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents whose last degree was received before June 30, 2015. Funds are available for tuition, fees, books, supplies, local transportation, and dependent care.

Applications for AAUW Career Development Grants are open until November 15, 2019.

CAREER ADVANCEMENT PATHWAY SPOTLIGHT: LESLIE ATKIN

Leslie Atkin, English composition assistant at Wheaton High School and 2019 Supporting Services Employee of the Year, has been employed as an English composition assistant for the last 10 years.

Tell us about yourself. I graduated from Tulane University in 1981, with a bachelor's degree in English and Political Science. Then, I worked in private industry for 18 years as a professional writer and editor before joining MCPS in 2008 as an English composition assistant (ECA). I have worked as an ECA at Walt Whitman and Kennedy high schools and now Wheaton High School. I have held several volunteer positions in the school system while our children made their way to graduation from Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School. Both adult children have now graduated from college and are working in their areas of passion in the work world.



Why did you choose MCPS as an employer? I already was volunteering at my kids' high school and heard about an opening at Walt Whitman High School from another volunteer parent. We both had backgrounds as writers and editors. She already worked at Whitman High School and told me how great the job was—meeting with students, working with teachers, and staying young (in spirit) in the high school environment. I gave it a chance and haven't looked back since!

Who should apply to be an English Composition Assistant? Great English composition assistants meet each student at his or her level, encourage those individuals about what they are doing right, and then try to raise the bar to improve his or her writing skills. In order to do this, ECAs need to quickly assess each student's abilities, get a feel for how to communicate effectively with that individual, and offer effective and simple methods that the students can use on their own. Great ECAs should stay positive and focus on student accomplishments while addressing a student's challenges. A sense of humor also is important!

How do you encourage employees to build their careers in MCPS? I participate in the MCPS Support Services Training Corps (SSTC), which offers professional development opportunities for support professionals. In particular, I act as a co-trainer with another MCPS employee. Together, we run a PDO course on improving punctuation and writing style for support professionals who are interested in becoming more effective writers. This would be a great class for employees to take to prepare for an English composition assistant. The SSTC is a great way to build your skills for future positions in MCPS.
