Welcome to **AEHS and MCPS pre-IB/AP US History for freshmen!** In **pre-IB Advanced Placement United States History** you will study America's story from pre-Columbian times to the present, and you will do so in depth. One major distinction between this course and other 9<sup>th</sup> grade US History courses (either honors or on-grade) is the amount of time and depth addressed. Regular classes begin their study of US History with the late 19<sup>th</sup> Century. We will begin with a study of North America when it was a continent of villages prior to C.E.1500 and we will conclude with the beginning of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. That means we will study about 500 years of history as opposed to just over a century. But the most significant distinction between our course and the others is that we will do more depth. In addition to this comprehensive amount of material, we will work on critical reading, writing, and research skills. **Time management will become your best friend; lack of success in that area will create undue stress in your life.** This may prove to be one of the most challenging courses you have ever taken. But with hard work comes satisfying results. If you commit to do your best, you should not be dissatisfied with the outcome. Be prepared to grow academically this year in AP US History.

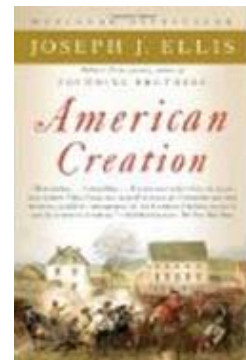

### **Your Summer Assignment**

You must read *The American Creation: Triumphs and Tragedies in the Founding of the Republic* by Joseph Ellis. (ISBN-10: 0307276457 or ISBN-13: 978-0307276452-) This book is a collection of stories about the beginnings of American democracy and will serve as a supplement to our textbook's coverage of the era from the War of Independence through the Louisiana Purchase. Take notes on each chapter of this book using your most effective method of note-taking. In your note-taking focus on:

- The complexities of the founding fathers
- The issues of politics and power
- How the issues in the book continue to be part of the American story

**Be prepared for your first quizzes on this reading during the first week of school.** These assessments will count toward your first quarter grade. If you read the book early in the summer make sure you review your notes at the end of the summer. **This book is approximately 300 pages long, so plan your time so that you will finish the reading before the first day of school.**

In addition to the assigned reading, I encourage you to do a lot of reading for pleasure this summer. Strong reading and writing skills are essential components for success in this class. The most successful students in this class have been those who have a love of reading. Strong readers make strong writers. As you read this summer, pay attention to the author's voice and tone. Make note of the variety of sentence structures. Notice the vocabulary used. You must not only comprehend what the author is **saying**, but what the author is **doing** through the careful selection of adjectives and verbs. To be successful in this course you must be able to apply your strong, focused reading skills to the challenge of reading a chapter a week in a college-level textbook. Furthermore, you must be able to demonstrate your knowledge of the reading by communicating that information in your own thoughtfully selected words. We will work on close reading skills and analytical writing throughout the year.

### **Course Expectations**

Strong time management skills are necessary for success in this class. You will learn to follow a college-style syllabus in order to keep up with the reading. There are 31 chapters in our textbook, and you are required to read all of them. One chapter is due each Monday. In addition to the textbook reading, there are primary source to read each week as well, due on Wednesday. So, you need to come up with a reading schedule for yourself. How will you get the reading done each week? Think about your schedule. You must allow time for this course the same way you schedule time for your other activities. My most successful students tend to be those who are involved in sports, music, theater and other activities and know how to set and follow a schedule. Procrastinators don't do well in this class. There is study hall each day in my classroom during lunch time. Plan to spend some time there each week, eating your lunch and working on AP US History. This course is difficult, but I will show you how to maneuver your way through the difficulty. You must come to this class with the motivation to do so.
