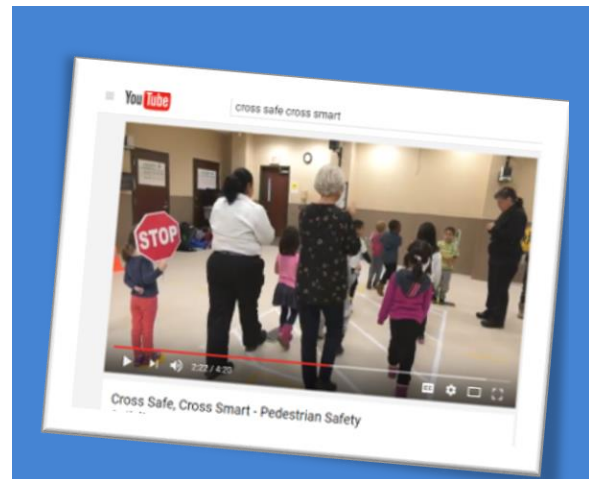

Reminders

It's that time of the year again, when the sun rises a little earlier and the night approaches a little sooner. As children are walking, biking and in transit during the early morning dusk or evenings, Safe Routes to School strongly encourages families to think about how to travel safely in the dark. Here are some tips on how you can be safe and be seen.

- » Be visible by carrying a flashlight or flashing pedestrian safety light, apply reflective stickers to your rain coat and backpack, and/or sew-on retro-reflective tape on your jacket and coat.
- » Be alert by taking out your ear buds and putting away your phone or other distractions while you cross the street.
- » Cross busy streets at a signal or marked mid-block crossing - drivers anticipate pedestrians at these locations more than unmarked crossings.
- » Look in all directions before crossing the street and cross after all the cars have stopped or passed.
- » Make eye contact with drivers before you cross to help communicate that drivers see you.
- » Stop and look to make sure cars have stopped for you before crossing the next lane of traffic.

Cross Safe, Cross Smart Training Video

In partnership with the City of Takoma Park SRTS program and Montgomery County Safe Kids, MCDOT developed a Crosswalk Activity Training Video called Cross Safe, Cross Smart. This video provides training for teachers, parents, and other interested parties on how to conduct a crosswalk simulation activity. This activity is geared for students in Kindergarten through 2nd grade and is designed to teach them the best practices for staying safe while crossing the street. Once you review the video, there are crosswalk kits available for use.

Sidewalk Network Helps Forest Knolls Students

MCDOT Division of Traffic Engineering and Operations received a complaint from the Northwood Forest residents regarding incomplete sidewalk and crosswalk networks within the neighborhood. There was an unfinished portion of sidewalk which forced pedestrians to cross over Edgewood Avenue to continue walking along the sidewalk. The lack of sidewalk also caused students and parents to cross the road a second time before arriving to Forest Knolls. The new sidewalk connection now allows pedestrians to have an uninterrupted path along the Hannes St. – Edgewood Ave. corridor. This improvement along with the new crosswalks installed at the Edgewood Ave. – Kerwin Rd. intersection has greatly enhanced the overall safety of the neighborhood roadways.

Don't Be Distracted Contest Coming Soon!

A Safe Kids study showed that 1 in 4 high school students and 1 in 6 middle school students walk distracted. These distractions were most often texting or wearing headphones. MCDOT will once again hold its annual Don't Be Distracted Creative Contest! The contest is open to all Montgomery County students in the K-12th grades. To enter the contest, individuals or groups must create a 30-60 second public service announcement (PSA) video or piece of artwork about why you shouldn't walk, or drive distracted. REMEMBER: Most pedestrian signals will not automatically change to provide pedestrian crossings at locations with push buttons; the button must be pushed to activate the signals.

Safe Routes to School in Montgomery County Targeted Education and Outreach Programs

Montgomery County's Safe Routes to School program provides education for safe and active walking and bicycling to and from school. It provides an opportunity to make walking and bicycling safer and more accessible for children, including those with disabilities, as well as to increase the number of children who chose to walk and bike. On a broader level Safe Routes to School can enhance children's health and well-being, ease traffic congestion near schools, improve air quality, and improve community member's overall quality of life.

Montgomery County's Safe Routes to School program is led by the Montgomery County Department of Transportation (MCDOT) and is supported by the Montgomery County Police Department, Montgomery County Fire Rescue Service, the Maryland Highway Safety Office, and other County and State agencies working to improve student safety. We work collaboratively with schools to develop creative solutions for school related traffic problems.
