# Dear Parents/Guardians:

The health and well-being of your children is of utmost importance to Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS). The Montgomery County Board of Education adopted Policy JPD, Emergency Care for Students Experiencing Anaphylaxis, and MCPS adopted Regulation JPD-RB, Emergency Care for Students Experiencing Anaphylaxis, to safeguard your children in the event of an emergency.

If your child has a known anaphylactic allergy, the Annotated Code of Maryland, Education Article, Section 7-426 states that parents/guardians are responsible for notifying schools of a child's special health care needs or diagnosis and providing appropriate medications. These medications may be kept in the school's health room for your child's use in case of an emergency. To do this, you will need to complete MCPS Form 525-14, Emergency Care for the Management of a Student with a Diagnosis of Anaphylaxis: Release and Indemnification Agreement for Epinephrine Auto Injector and deliver the properly labeled epinephrine auto-injector to school. The form may be obtained from your school nurse or from the following website at www.montgomeryschoolsmd.org/departments/forms/pdf/525-14 pdf.

We understand that parents/guardians or students may not know of an anaphylactic allergy until an emergency situation arises. Maryland requires that all schools train their staff members to recognize signs of anaphylaxis and maintain a stock supply of epinephrine auto-injectors (i.e., EpiPen) for use in case of an emergency. Designated staff members at each school are trained to administer EpiPens. Please be assured that whenever an epinephrine auto-injector is used, whether it belongs to your child or is one of the school's stock supply, 911 and you will be called.

I am aware that the injection may be administered by a trained, unlicensed staff member, I have read the procedures outlined on the back of this form and assume the responsibilities as required. I understand that the rescue squad (911) will always be called when an epinephrine auto injector is administered, whether or not the student manifests any symptoms of anaphylaxis. # Annotated Code of Maryland Education Division II. Elementary and Secondary Education [Titles 2–9] Title 7. Public Schools Subtitle 4. Health and Safety of Students

MD Code, Education, § 7-426.2

§ 7-426.2. Authorization to administer auto-injectable epinephrine

Effective: July 1, 2013

#### **Definitions**

- (a) (1) In this section the following words have the meanings indicated.
  - (2) "Anaphylaxis" means a sudden, severe, and potentially life-threatening allergic reaction that occurs when an individual is exposed to an allergen.
  - (3) "Auto-injectable epinephrine" means a portable, disposable drug delivery device that contains a premeasured single dose of epinephrine that is used to treat anaphylaxis in an emergency situation.

#### Policy relating to auto-injectable epinephrine

- (b) Each county board shall establish a policy for public schools within its jurisdiction to authorize the school nurse and other school personnel to administer auto-injectable epinephrine, if available, to a student who is determined to be or perceived to be in anaphylaxis, regardless of whether the student:
  - (1) Has been identified as having an anaphylactic allergy, as defined in § 7-426.1 of this subtitle; or
  - (2) Has a prescription for epinephrine as prescribed by an authorized licensed health care practitioner under the Health Occupations Article.

# Scope of policy

- (c) The policy established under subsection (b) of this section shall include:
  - (1) Training for school personnel on how to recognize the symptoms of anaphylaxis;
  - (2) Procedures for the emergency administration of auto-injectable epinephrine;

- (3) The proper follow-up emergency procedures;
- (4) A provision authorizing a school nurse to obtain and store at a public school auto-injectable epinephrine to be used in an emergency situation; and
- (5) A requirement that each public school develop and implement a method for notifying the parents or guardians of students of the school's policy under this section at the beginning of each school year.

## Liability of school nurses or other school personnel

(d) Except for any willful or grossly negligent act, a school nurse or other school personnel who respond in good faith to the anaphylactic reaction of a child in accordance with this section may not be held personally liable for any act or omission in the course of responding to the reaction.

## Reporting requirements

- (e) (1) Each public school shall submit, on the form that the Department requires, a report to the Department on each incident at the school or at a related school event that required the use of auto-injectable epinephrine.
  - (2) The Department shall develop and disseminate a standard form to report each incident requiring the use of auto-injectable epinephrine at a public school.
